OUR VOCATION: BUILDING HUMAN COMMUNITIES

Father General, Most Rev. Arturo Abascal Sosa visited, Nepal at Maheshpur, Dt. Jhapa in February end. He concelebrated at Sunday Mass on 29 February. With the help of an interpreter, he addressed the parishioners, confirming the commitment of the Society of Jesus amidst them.

I am grateful to you, my brother Jesuits, parishioners, Sisters and collaborators for your indomitable spirit and relentless work that you are doing in the Jhapa district. You live in a multi-cultural context wherein you constantly encounter different languages, faiths and cultures. This is indeed a challenging situation. Some of your ancestors moved in from India to work in the tea gardens here. Some of you are bonafide citizens of Nepal. I am aware that there was a time that you could not even practice and profess your faith freely. Until the arrival of the Jesuits in late 1990s priests were not available for the Eucharist and the other Sacraments. You used to walk miles to attend the Eucharist in India. Yet you persevered in your faith. I admire and appreciate your faith in Jesus Christ.

At the end of 1990s, the Nepal Jesuit Society branched out to Jhapa with the objective of educating the Catholic children and to provide spiritual ministry to the faithful. Within 20 years, the mission has expanded to include four schools, one parish, one quasi parish and six Mass centers. Every Easter there are new families who opt to be baptized. There are great prospects of evangelization. The fact that more families are getting attracted to the Church is a sign that you are living good and edifying Christian lives. I would like to thank the catechists for their evangelical spirit. Your parish is one of the promising seedbeds of vocations to the religious life. Pray for religious vocations. I encourage the boys and girls to think about religious vocation.

I am aware that the conditions of the people are very difficult. Education is one of the means of empowerment. It widens our perspectives and broadens our horizons. It is important to remember that education is a game changer. It can help to enhance job opportunities and ultimately, the standard of life. Therefore, I encourage parents to educate your children. Motivate the youth to study well. However, education to develop the head alone is not enough; we need to educate our hearts too. Jesuit education aims at all-round development.

Today the world is changing fast; a lot of good is taking place but at the same time, there are problems that create divisions based on religion and culture. The Christian vocation and the mission of the Jesuits as well, is to promote reconciliation, justice and peace, thus contributing to the building up of human communities.

It is important to remember that whatever work we do is God's work and we are mere collaborators in His work. The work of God does not belong exclusively to any one Religious Congregation or person. Therefore, we have to collaborate with all people of good will who are engaged in and desirous of building up a world that is more humane and more just.

JVM , PATHALGAON

A meeting at Kadampara-Ghutiyapara, Surguja, was held on 3rd Feb. 2020 from 7.00 PM to 9.00 PM. Fr. Yacub Kujur was invited by Mr. Telesphore Toppo, a government school teacher, on behalf of the village. More than 60 villagers attended the meeting. The talk began with displacement and it was connected with PESA, FRA, NRC, CAA, and NPR and was told that only PESA and FRA could save tribals from displacement for which claim procedure has to be followed immediately. Socio-economic and political analysis was done with the villagers. The talk was very interactive and they liked it very much. The purpose was to train our people to speak out their feelings and experiences. Keeping quiet by our people at time of need is one of the main weaknesses of our people.

One Day Seminar on FRA, CAA, NRC, NPR and other social Issues:

The Seminar began in Ghutiyapara Parish on 09 Feb. at 09.00 AM and was concluded at 02.30 PM. First, Fr. Yacub did societal analysis during homily and after the Mass focused on preparing a concrete action plan. First, a plan was made on FRA (Forest Right Act, 2006) and to form Gram Sabha according to PESA and hold GS and form Van Adhikar Samiti to initiate the process of claim of FRA. To be trained for the process of claim of FRA some will participate in the training program to be held at JVM on 15 Feb. Second, a protest gathering on CAA will be held at Dhorhagaon, date and mode will be decided by the core committee. Third, efforts will be made for second crop by creating water resource bodies. Fourth, efforts will be made for business by market linkage. Our people will be encouraged to buy things from our shopkeepers. Fifth, efforts will be made to minimize social evils, such as over drinking, envy, aimlessness of youth, etc. Sixth, a follow up seminar will be held soon. The newly elected Panches and *Surpanches* were felicitated. And a separate seminar will be held for them soon under the leadership of Mr. Rajesh Tigga, new elected *Surpanch*.

A seminar on FRA to plan for campaign was jointly organized by JVM, Lok Manch and Chawpal Gramin Vikas Evam Shodh Sansthan on 15 February at Ashadeep. About 150 people, interested in claiming rights, participated in it. Fr. Yacub Kujur, SJ welcomed the participants and told the purpose of gathering. The newly elected Panches, BDCs were felicitated with a shawl each. Mr. Alok Shukla, the convener of CBA (Chhattisgarh Bachao Andolan) explained in detail the FRA and Mr. Gangaram Painkra, director of Chawpal narrated his field experience on the issue. Two important action plans were made; first, by April at least ten CFR (Community Forest Rights) will be claimed in Jashpur; second, to accelerate the process a workshop will be arranged by JVM, CBA and Chawpal on 16-17 March. Fr. Bipin Kujur, SJ proposed a vote of thanks.

A month training for 19 catechists is going on at Ashadeep, under the leadership of Fr. Agapit Tirkey, SJ., Fr. Yacub took more than thirty classes for them. He gave the societal analysis starting with "I came that they might have life and have it in fullness" (Jn. 10:10). Jesus came to give fullness of life. The fullness consists in living a life comprising of spiritual, social, political and economic factors. The purpose of life is to be attuned to Jesus. That will be possible through service and service with love and justice (Mt. 25:31-46). Fr. Yacub gave spiritual, social, political and economic analysis and taught the catechists communication skills, leadership skills, financial management, time management, Johari window, SWOT, FRA, PESA, CAA, government schemes so that their homily attracts more people to come to church on Sundays. He gave the above analysis on 16 February to the participants of Deanery Catholic Sabha Rally held at Hal-dijharia Parish. The participants decided to submit a memorandum against CAA, NRC, and NPR.

JESUIT MISSION IN MP

Article 25

When Fr. Van der Linden wrote the last mentioned letter, he was already in charge of Noadih. Just at that time Fr. Bressers and he were made to exchange places. Fr. Bressers was now put in charge of Tongo, and became Superior of Barway. Thus the districts of Jashpur depending on those two stations had now a change of Missionaries too. Towards the end of 1912, the Archbishop was seeking for another interview with the higher authorities in the central Provinces. On 11 December, he asked Mr. Laurie for an interview. Mr. Laurie, his old friend, was then fixed at Raipur, as Commissioner of the Chhattisgarh division. He replied on 19 December that owing to his multiple duties he would be away till the end of January. He added: "I saw the Raja Bahadur of Jashpur lately and asked him to try and make things go quietly and peaceably.

He has no religious *animus*, as far as I can judge, but objects merely to interference in matters of administration. I certainly sympathize with him in this. If missionaries cannot let 'begar' alone, the Raja Bahadur can hardly be blamed if he makes it uncomfortable for them to stay in the state. I am not now Political Agent: It is Mr. Blakesley I.C.S. who holds that office. He will, I have no doubt, be pleased to see you and to discuss matters with you at any time when you are up in this part of the world. I saw the Bishop at Nagpur and he was talking to me about this Jashpur business. I am inclined to think that he sees, as no doubt you do, the difficulty of interfering with state customs. I do not think that the cause of Christianity can prosper if people are encouraged to defy the rules of the state; harsh as they may be to some Missionaries appear. The converts should be made to 'render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's.' This is my view." The last sentence looks like a reference to Mr. Napier's proposed tract. It is certainly strange, and must have been painful to the Archbishop, that a man who knew Jashpur and had rendered signal services to the Mission, would now throw all the blame on the Missionaries and their converts, praise the Raja and totally ignore that the root of all the trouble was the open persecution overtly encouraged by the Chief, and aiming at stamping out Christianity.

On 27 December, the Archbishop wrote to Sir B. Robertson, Chief Commissioner of the central provinces, asking for an interview with him. A personal letter was sent in reply two days later on 27-12-1912, stating that he, Sir B. Robertson, had received the request and the details about the state of affairs in Jashpur. As the programme at Durg was so charged, all he could arrange for was to meet him between 12 and 1 o'clock that day, 5th January: "I have already heard that there had been some trouble between the state authorities and the Native Christians. But from what I know of the Feudatory Chief, he appears to me to be a well disposed and goodly man and I can hardly think that the fault is all on his side. I shall be prepared, however, to listen to what you have to say and take the matter further into consideration when I have consulted the political authorities.

It must have been very disappointing to the Archbishop, that after all the contrary testimonies of his Missionaries sent to those high authorities; one and all persisted in looking on the Raja as "a well disposed and goodly man." (Robertson), "who has no religious *animus*" (Laurie), who cares only about his rights and submission of his people and "not two pence what religion they profess" (Napier), "a liberal minded man; a gentleman who would consider it below his dignity to persecute any of his subjects on the grounds of their creeds alone, a just man," (Blakesley). It was precisely because of the persecution he led or inspired or encouraged, that the Archbishop sought these interviews.

About the interview, the Archives contain only the draft of a small letter. 2nd January 1913: The Archbishop states that he will reach the bungalow at Durg at the appointed time. "My main contention is that the Christians of Jashpur do not enjoy the religious freedom which the British Government guarantees to all its subjects: (1) they have a right to the proper, lawful exercise of their religion: chapels, residences of missionaries of their religion: a) for divine service, b) for instruction. (2) They are molested on account of their religion. This is refused, avowedly the fact of the Rajah himself. It is a fact, either willed or permitted by the Rajah, or if neither he cannot control his subordinates (in any case maladministration).

Happily the Memorandum to the Viceroy throws some light. It took place on 5th Jan at Durg. "When, in answer to my representations, the Chief Commissioner told me that Jashpur was as independent as Germany or France, that he, the Chief Commissioner, could interfere as

little in the Jashpur matters, as he could in those of Germany, the impression that I could no longer hope for redress from the authorities of the Central Provinces was very naturally forced on me.”

Whilst appreciating and sympathizing with the reasons which led Sir Benjamin Robertson to give the principle of non-intervention the widest possible play, I would respectfully draw attention to the indisputable inference that, if pushed too far, this principle turns automatically into a positive intervention of a very objectionable kind, in as much as it becomes equivalent to declaring practically that the British Government no longer intends checking any kind of maladministration in the Feudatory states. Such a point has, in the matter of religious toleration and freedom, been actually reached in Jashpur. After Sir Benjamin Robertson had read to me certain directions of his predecessor, Sir Reginald Craddock, in which, *inter alia*, it was stated that the Chief of Jashpur was obliged to grant his Christian subjects leave to erect places of Christian worship and residences for their pastors. Sir Benjamin Robertson said that he was not prepared to oblige the Chief to this. I submit that this practically amounts to encouraging the Chief to in his persistent refusal. And I furthermore maintain that, for the Chief to pretend that religious toleration is safeguarded in his state, when his Christian subjects are neither allowed to have places of worship, nor to have their pastors residing amongst them is an evident contradiction.

Mr. Blakesley was present at Durg on that occasion. We see this from a letter of his to the Archbishop, dated 19 February 1913, in which according to the desire expressed there, he communicated the list of his camps at his coming visits to Jashpur for the benefit of the local missionaries. Fr. Van den Driessche, in consequence of Mr. Blakesley’s talk with the Archbishop, had a dispute with him about “excessive begari”.

Fr. Bressers knowing the intention of the Archbishop to try and meet Mr. Blakesley sent to him some information on 17 February 1913:

“Your Grace desires no doubt to know whether any new important events have occurred. I am glad to state that there are none. I see nothing about which the Christians might with some success forward a complaint to the Political Agent. But there is a statement of the Rajah which clearly gives the lie to Mr. Laurie’s pretension that the Chief does not want to do anything against the Christian religion.” Then comes the case of the 7 Bhudkela people, already related by Fr. Van der Linden, who were taken to the Chief after having been to church on Sunday. On their refusing to give up the Christian religion, the Chief said: “Go to *girja* as much as you like, but in that case, give up your fields. Gather the crops of this year, but do not work in the land anymore.”

Fr. Bressers says that it would be very injudicious to mention that they were subsequently sent to Jharsuguda and that they had to wait there for the return of the Raja from Nagpur, because others who were not Christians were forced to do the same. Fr. Bressers little suspected that the calm would soon be disturbed by two events of the utmost importance, and of painful worry to him: one of Patratoli, the other at Badka Koronja. Whether the Political Agent came as announced, is stated nowhere. Anyhow from the correspondence left, we may conclude that neither the Archbishop nor any of the Missionaries interviewed him.
