George Pattery, Jossie D'Mello, Nithin Monteiro, and Siji Chacko. The MDU-CEN Province Retreat with Fr. Francis Pudhicherry as Director (2-10 May 2020 at SHC, Shembaganur) and MDU-CEN Young Priests' Retreat with Fr. Errol Fernandes as Director (13-21 May 2020 at JMJ Retreat Centre, Sirumalai) stand cancelled.

The print edition of MNL April-May 2020 will be mailed to you whenever it is ready.

Formees Summer Programme: The formees of both MDU and CEN Provinces were directed by Fr. PCF to join the LIFE LINE – in solidarity with.... online retreat. They are very well engaged and guided by spiritual directors in their respective places. At the end of the online retreat, they will stay put wherever they are unless the government lifts the lockdown or does so maybe temporarily only to impose it again. In any case, in order to minimize the travels of scholastics, those who find themselves in the northern part of Tamil Nadu will be accommodated at Dhyana Ashram, Chennai, and those who are in the south will be asked to stay at Beschi Illam, Dindigul. After the online retreat, if the lockdown is extended, it is planned to engage them in online courses supported by LIBA and other online training institutes. The first-year theologians are working on a suitable study package.

If there is abatement of the global crisis, things get better, and freedom of movement is restored, then we may have the Formation Meet as usual in May at SHC, Shembag, followed by a three-day triduum and renewal of vows for all the formees.

COVID-19 and CEN-MDU Jubilarians Day:

We do not know whether it is going to get better or get worse before getting better. Please stay tuned and you will be told whether or not the Jubilarians Day will be celebrated at Beschi, Dindigul, on 29 May 2020 as scheduled.

Fr. General will be visiting Chennai in February 2021 for the 125 anniversary celebrations of Satya Nilayam. He will arrive at Satya Nilayam on 20 February morning and be there for the Cultural Programme on 20 February evening and Mass, Public Function and Lunch on 21 February morning. WHAT IS NOVEL CORONAVIRUS (COVID-19)?

Be aware, prepare yourself but don't panic!

MICROBES or microorganisms are tiny living things found all around us and cannot be seen by the naked eye. Human body is home to billions of microbes namely bacteria, fungi, protozoan and viruses. Many microbes are vital and essential for human health. However, some bacteria and viruses could be harmful to human beings.

VIRUSES are smaller than bacteria. The largest virus is smaller than the smallest bacterium. Viruses need other living organisms for their survival and multiplication. **CORONAVIRUSES** are a family of viruses that infect humans, animals and birds; they cause respiratory and gastrointestinal diseases. They cause illness starting from common cold to more severe diseases such as, Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS) and the Middle East Respiratory Syndrome (MERS). However, the present infection worldwide is due to a novel coronavirus transmitted human-human. Currently Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome Coronavirus-2 (SARS-CoV-2) called as a novel virus causes Coronavirus Disease 2019 known as COVID-19. This virus was initially transmitted from bats / pangolins to humans in China. COVID-19 causes respiratory tract disease in people. Be aware, but do not panic. Individually and collectively we must take the necessary preventive and curative action to overcome this infection.

GLOBAL IMPACT OF COVID-19 PANDEMIC: As on April 11, 2020, there are 17,80,271 coronavirus cases (4,04,029 recovered and 1,08,822 deaths) at the global level. In India there are 6,634 coronavirus cases (652 recovered and 242 deaths). There are 911 confirmed cases (44 recovered and 8 deaths) in Tamil Nadu.

DIFFERENCE BETWEEN ORDINARY COUGH AND COVID-19: Cold and cough are generally due to an allergic reaction. A fever with cough and a runny nose is a symptom of the flu. When you have fever with dry cough and have breathing difficulty, these can be the symptoms of coronavirus infection. The symptoms of COVID-19 may start from the onset to clinical recovery for mild cases 2-3 weeks, but 4-6 weeks for severe cases. Some of the common symptoms are: Dry cough, high fever, sore throat, difficulty in breathing, headache and fatigue.

WHAT TO DO WHEN YOU HAVE SYMPTOMS: You should contact your doctor immediately and share your symptoms over the phone. Currently the only way to be tested for COVID-19 is to use national or state helpline numbers. Helplines: 1075 / 1800-112-545 / 011-23978046 (National); 044-29510500 (Tamil Nadu) and 104 (Puducherry).

VULNERABLE TO COVID-19: People of all age groups may be affected by COVID-19 but the elderly (above 65 years), alcoholics, diabetic patients, transplant patients, asthmatics, cardiac patients, persons with less immunity and children are at the highest risk of COVID-19 infection.

PREVENTION: While COVID-19 spreads through cough, sneeze, personal contact, contaminated objects and mass gatherings, the best ways to protect yourself and others are as follows: 1. Wash your hands often for 20 seconds with water and soap or use sanitizer (60% alcohol); 2. Drink plenty of water/liquids; 3. Avoid contact with sick people; 4. Cover your mouth and nose when you cough or sneeze; 5. Stay home and self-isolate yourself, and 6. Do not touch your

eyes, nose or mouth with unclean hands; 7. Eat nutritious food.

Twenty seconds are roughly the time it takes silently to recite two Hail Marys. Don't let the tap run while you wash your hands. Open it only to wet your hands and, after you have worked up a lather and cleaned hands thoroughly as shown in the picture, open the tap again to rinse your hands and wipe them dry.

TREATMENT: Currently there is no specific drug for curing the confirmed COVID-19 patients. Let your doctor prescribe drugs following the guidelines of the Union Health Ministry.



CRY OF THE WORLD & OUR PROACTIVE RESPONSE: As we know very well, the entire human community is collectively facing the serious coronavirus challenge. The poor, migrants, street children, refugees, beggars, differently-abled and the elderly people are suffering a lot every minute as our crucified Lord Jesus suffered. With innovative strategies and the mighty power of the Risen Lord, let us individually and collectively get involved fully in rebuilding the lives of our people.

HOW DID MDU JESUITS RESPOND TO COVID-19?

As the COVID-19 crisis was unfolding, urgent communications started going from the Province Curia. With the threat of contagion becoming real, an email dated 11 March 2020, announced the indefinite postponement of the following scheduled meetings:

March

- 14 Meeting of LS/TL/Coord. of MDU-CEN, Maduralaya
- 15 Meeting of LS/TL, Maduralaya
- 16 CEN-MDU Joint Consult, Maduralaya

Visitations and out-of-Dindigul visits of Fr. Provincial were postponed indefinitely/cancelled. Province Consult proceedings were shifted from real face-to-face meetings to virtual face-to-face Skype online meetings.

In email communications, Fr. Provincial, emphasized our complementary response of social distancing and social outreach in this time of crisis. He emphasized the need to do whatever we could for the people most affected by the mounting economic crisis going hand in hand with the Coronavirus pandemic. Our domestic co-workers on a monthly salary would continue to get their salary whether or not they could report to work or be given temporary board and room facilities. Assistance in cash or kind (groceries, food items, soap, sanitizers, masks etc.) was encouraged to be given to the poor, particularly, daily wage labourers and piece-rate workers whose services we have been using in our communities, institutions, centres, parishes, farms and estates.

At the Province level, Fr. Provincial constituted a COVID-19 Disaster Management Committee (CDMC) with

- Fr. Joseph Xavier P. (Coordinator of Secondary Education Commission)

whose primary task would be to network with the conveners of the community-level teams, compare notes regarding the best practices observed in our institutions /centres, share all this information and thus animate and coordinate various relief measures.

Seven of these relief measures have been uploaded so far in the Curia website in the *Ministries of consolation–catalogue* (Explore our local online initiatives for the time of the global health crisis).

Arul Anandar College, Karumathur, identified in its surrounding 15 ARISE villages 300 most needy families. A package of 10 kg rice was supplied to each family with the help of and supported by the government officials. Similarly, in an attempt to serve the poorest of the poor, AAC relief workers ventured out with provision kits of rice and groceries worth Rs. 1,000 each to 200 poor rural families, chiefly Dalits-Arundhadiars and Narikoravars in Usilampatty and three ARISE villages in the neighbouring areas of Karumathur .



In its action taken report, Carmel HS School, Nagercoil, states: We conducted a COVID-19 awareness programme for the staff and students on March 16th with the assistance Drs. Kinsal and Mary Latha, officials from the Corporation. At the initiative taken by our NCC cadets, we facilitated all our staff and students to take an oath to adhere to the orders given by the Central and State Governments with regard to selfisolation, social distancing and stay at home to protect our country from COVID-19.

We printed 5,000 COVID-19 awareness pamphlets and, with the help of our staff and students distributed the same to the primary school students and their parents in quite a few villages of Kanyakumari and Tirunelveli Districts. The same awareness pamphlets were distributed to 626 Class XI students and 576 Class XII students from four different schools that had Carmel as the centre for the Government Public Examinations. Besides, these students were also provided with soap and sanitizers.

Forty staff visited remote villages and distributed food packets to the poorest of the poor. Also, they

gave counselling to many on how to face COVID-19 fearlessly. We identified 10 students from Below Poverty Line families and distributed Rs 3,000 to each of those families. Similarly, we have identified 29 families in our neighbourhood – either widows or daily wage earners and have planned to provide them with grocery items. Through JMAADD we are giving online counselling to patients and are planning to give one-on-one onsite counselling with due permission from the civil authorities. We are contemplating the formation of a committee with representatives from the management, staff, PTA and alumni to coordinate all these activities and we have set aside Rs. 70,000 from our funds so far for the COVID-19 relief work and many of our staff members also have been contributing generously to this cause.

DACA, **Madurai**, has accommodated within its campus eight of its co-workers from the start of the COVID-19 lockdown and provided them with masks and sanitizers. Moreover, DACA provided full salary to all its 14 coworkers for April 2020.

De Britto HS School, Devakottai, has supplied groceries to 30 families including our domestic co-workers and migrants.

IDEAS-LAAS, Madurai, has come up with a variety of services during the COVID-19 lockdown. Awareness about the pandemic was given through social media, mobile radio "namma kural" and over the mobile phone for:

• eight days to 670 conservancy workers in Madurai and Virudhunagar districts

• 15 days to 2,300 unorganised workers in Sivakasi, Sattur, Thirumangalam, Vadippatti, Kodaikanal, Oddanchathiram taluks, and

• eight days to 2,000 Dalit working women in Dindigul, Virudhunagar, Theni, Sivagangai, Ramnad, Thoothukudi, Madurai, Nellai districts.

Also, on March 20th, at Mattuthavani, Madurai, the team members gave a demonstration on hand wash to a crowd of 1,000 people and then distributed handbills on COVID-19 to 5,000 people. Besides, they have taken steps to ensure the availability of the full protective gear to conservancy workers with accompanying training on the need for using it. The team has also been bringing the difficulties of the scavengers to the attention of the authorities at the local and district levels through email and WhatsApp.

Our Jesuit companions of **Kalangarai**, **Nagapattinam**, have contacted nearly 1,000 rural poor widows and deserted women from 200 families in Sirkazhi, Nagai and Keelaiyur Panchayat Unions through phone and instructed them on how to avail themselves of both the State and Central Governments relief packages.

The Jesuit community of LTI, Madurai, provided rice and dhal packages, each costing Rs.1,000, to 50 poor

families, especially to those involved in scavenging work in and around Gnanaolivupuram. The Loyola Media team has come out with 20 professional 3-minute videos and has reached out to a few lakhs of people through social media. While some of these videos entertain and educate the public on COVID-19, the others promote Christian spirituality and responsibility during the Lenten season. For the past three weeks, personal counselling has been provided by Frs. Emmanuel and Richard to a minimum 12 persons per day from around the world through helpline calls.

Jesuits of **Xaveriana, Thoothukudi**, are awaiting the formal request from the district administration through the diocese to open our school premises to support the government and the people in the fight against the Coronavirus. In the meantime, they have provided a financial aid of Rs. 2,000 to some of their co-workers who needed it. Apart from this, 80 poor people who sought alms were given Rs. 50 to Rs. 100 each depending upon their condition.

In collaboration with the District Collectorate, the Chemistry Department of St. Joseph's College, Tiruchi, prepared hand sanitizers for the use of health workers. Earlier, the hand sanitizers were prepared only for the staff and the few hostellers in the campus. St. Joseph's community used the public address system in the parish and the sub-stations to spread COVID-19 awareness. Food materials were distributed to Mullaikudi Parish and its substations (120 families), Our Lady of Lourdes Parish (110 families), Devarayaneri Gypsy Village (250 Gypsy families) and some campus employees. RO Drinking Water was provided daily to 100 pavement dwellers and passers-by and financial assistance given to the African students, orphans and semi orphans. As a public welfare measure, the school playground has been converted into a vegetable market; 60 classrooms in the school, 63 classrooms in the college and 460 rooms in the college hostels have been transformed into isolation wards. St. Joseph's Disaster Management Committee headed by Fr. John Wilson



and guided by Frs. Rector, Principal and Parish Priests is planning further activities including appeals to donors to join St. Joseph's in this venture of assisting those most affected by the pandemic .

The Superior and community of **St. Mary's HS School**, **Dindigul**, have readily come forward to make available the school building to COVID-19 patients and are waiting for the word of acceptance from the district civil authorities. Also, they have provided financial assistance to 50 poor families and daily wage earners in Dindigul town.

The CDMC members of **St. Mary's HS School**, **Madurai**, are collecting data. They have planned to reach out to around 150 families of the needy and daily wage earners in their immediate neighbourhood. Generously the school has made available its grounds during the lockdown for locating a vegetable market and parking of vehicles. Thousands of people benefit from this arrangement. The community has also been taking care of the basic needs of 21 families of our domestic co-workers in and around the school campus.

Our Jesuit confreres of **St. Xavier's, Palayamkottai**, have been involved in several services during the Corona lockdown. They have planned to offer the District Collector the school and college hostels for the use of quarantined people. Besides, a team has been appointed to help the



government officials with logistics. Secondly, they have given their domestic workers special incentives. Thirdly, they have mobilised women students in NSS to give awareness on Corona to the villages around Palayamkottai. Fourthly, when the demand for sanitizers was exponentially increasing due to the Corona pandemic and the available sanitizers were beyond the reach of common people, with the help of its Xavier Research Foundation under the leadership Fr. Ignacimuthu, the college made an effective herbal and organic sanitizer (Xavier Sanitizer-XS சவேரியார் கிருமி விரட்டி) and distributed 300 bottles of it to police personnel and the STAND villages (STAND - Students' Training and Action for Neighbourhood Development). Fifthly, the technology has been transferred to a small local company 'Biomeitez' to manufacture and market it. Xavier Research Foundation will keep a check over the quality and pricing.

Beschi Illam, Dindigul: On March 18th, Sr. Smita PDDM gave an awareness talk to our 23 novices on the prevention of COVID-19. An urgent community meeting was called by Fr. Michael Doss, Superior, on March 25th for information sharing on the ways and means by which we could prevent the spread of COVID-19. Later that day, at 4:30 p.m., united in spirit with Pope Francis, community members recited the Lord's Prayer seeking deliverance from the Coronavirus menace.

From March 26th, while a few non-residential coworkers of Beschi Illam, Dindigul, have moved in, others have been given leave with salary during the lockdown. All co-workers now at work, formed Jesuits, novices, and scholastics relocated from Pune are provided with soap, sanitizers and face masks. Two domestic coworkers' families residing within Beschi campus, are provided with rice and groceries.

Substituting the co-workers not able to report to work, our novices have plunged into action. They are engaged in domestic, dairy and agri farm activities, and in caring for our senior Jesuits in Arrupe Bhavan. During their free time, they meet in small groups of 3 or 4 and have spiritual conversation, read and share on GC 35, and meet the Director of Novices once in three days to share and get helped in this time of change and challenge.

Maduralaya, **Dindigul**, continues to operate with skeleton resident staff. If absolutely necessary, essential staff drop in during curfew relaxation hours to complete urgent tasks. All get their normal salary and our estates, too, have been instructed to pay their registered workers and financially assist unregistered workers to buy provisions. They have also kept their vehicles ready at the service of the people in remote places. Soap, sanitizers and masks have been given. As per directives of the Government of India Ministry of Home Affairs

that have allowed resumption of farming operations by farmers and farm workers in the field, workers residing in and around our estates in Kodai Hills and Sirumalai have started reporting to work; rollcall is dispensed with and social distancing is insisted on. They are given masks to wear and soap and water are kept for their use.

JRS-TN: On March 23rd, it was announced that all JRS-TN programmes which would necessitate gathering a group of children/people would be suspended with immediate effect till further notice. JRS-TN Complementary Education Centres in the camps have been left open for the use of the administrative authorities and medical officers who visit the camps. Keeping in mind the precarious situation in the camps, the JRS-TN field staff, who are refugees themselves, have been urged to work in tandem with the camp authorities and the camp committee as well as the camp youth to carry out necessary and suitable preventive measures. In general, the camp inmates fenced the camps with sarees to discourage the entry of outsiders into the camp and to prevent contamination.



Tiruchi Zone: The youth along with JRS staff Mr. Mariyadoss have been spraying herbal sanitizer – made of salt, neem leaves, turmeric and water – to prevent the spread of COVID-19. Mrs. Mano Shanthi, teacher of Life Skills Training Centre, JRS-TN, along with the participants trained in the advance level training offered by JRS, stitched 500 masks and distributed to the camp inmates in Okkur and Kariyoor as preventive measures for COVID-19. Besides, 224 members of the Sri Lankan refugee camp at Okkur have been provided with groceries. In Thoopukollai, Pudukottai, the youth contacted the local health inspectors to spray chemical sanitizers in the camp.

Nellai Zone: The youth club members of Perumalpuram camp in Kanyakumari district created and circulated a video highlighting the need for sanitizing the camps. Under the able guidance of Ms. Indumathi, staff, JRS-TN, the adult volunteers in the camp made use of the

JRS Complementary Education Centre and prepared 1,000 masks for free distribution among camp inmates and among people of the host community in the neighbourhood on March 29th and 31st. With funds raised by themselves, the youth in Kolivizhai camp, Kanyakumari District, distributed groceries to the camp inmates on March 31st. JRS Complementary Education Centres in Kolivizhai and Pagode camps in Kanyakumari district were used by the government medical team to scan the camp inmates for possible Coronavirus infection on March 31st. In collaboration with the fire service personnel, Ms. Indumathi and some youth volunteers sanitized the Kangaikondam camp as a preventive measure to control the spread of COVID - 19.

Sch. Raphael Alexander writes from Paris, France

The real celebration of Hope is already and not-yet. France is fighting hard to overcome the havoc created in the hope that the Risen Lord offers to each one of us. As far as the Jesuits in Europe are concerned, it is the EOF (Europe Occidentale Francophone) Province that is worst affected by this monstrous pandemic. It is hard to digest and accept the continuous death announcements of senior Jesuits almost every day (so far 15). Some of these EOF Jesuits have been in one way or the other associated with Madurai Province, for example, Fr. Henri Madelin, former Provincial (1979-1985). At present, three homes of the aged EOF Jesuits and a few apostolic communities, too, have been combatting this dangerous virus. The community of Sèvres in Paris in which I reside and the community of the Immaculate Conception at Pau in which Fr. Arsène Annasse (MDU) resides are so far safe and we are keeping fine. My Diaconate Ordination that was initially planned to take place on 18 April 2020 is postponed to 20 June due to COVID-19. Let the Risen Lord restore all to health!

Kudiyurimai Manadu (Peoples' Citizenship Public Meeting), Palayamkottai

JCERT, in collaboration with PCM (Peoples' Citizenship Movement), organized a massive public meeting on 7 March 2020 in Palayamkottai to affirm the citizenship rights of the people of India against the backdrop of the recently enacted CAA (Citizenship Amendment Act), NPR (National Population Register) and NRC (National Register of Citizens). Most of the major national and regional political parties participated in this meeting. The dignitaries who enlightened the gathering through their powerful speeches included Mr. V. Narayanasamy, CM, Pondy, Dr. Thol. Thirumavalavan MP and President of Viduthalai Chiruthaihal, Prof. Jawaharullah, President, Manitha Neya Makkal Katchi,



Maulana P.A. Kaja Muhaideen, President, Tamilnadu Jamma Adul Ulma Society, Most Rev. Antonysamy Savarimuthu, Bishop of Palayamkottai, Br. Ravi S.H.J., President, TN-CRI, and a few other prominent persons from political, religious and social organizations. Fr. S.M. John Kennedy, Director of JCERT and Coordinator of PCM and Mr. Britto, Lawyer, organized the entire programme. About 15,000 people including Muslims, Christians and Hindus participated in the meeting. Everyone was astonished to realize that it was a highly disciplined, purpose-driven gathering and meeting.

At the end of it, all took a pledge to protect the Indian Constitution in the context of the threat to it from the sectarian ruling forces. The important resolutions, presented and passed during the meeting were:

• the unconditional withdrawal of CAA, as it is discriminatory and against the fundamental rights enshrined in the Indian Constitution.

stopping the process of NPR and NRC, as it might



result in the denial of Indian citizenship to religious and ethnic minorities.

• impartial inquiry into the recent riots in Delhi with stringent punishment for the instigators and adequate compensation for the victims and

• ensuring the protection of the Indian Constitution and constitutional and fundamental rights of the citizens of India.

This meeting was unique on several counts. It was the first of its kind in the whole of Tamil Nadu for Christians taking up the initiative to organize such a mega event against CAA, NPR and NRC, involving people from all major religions, major political parties, human rights, social and religious organizations and CRI units. It was the first such meeting where so many prominent political and religious leaders shared the dais and addressed the gathering. Thus it became a valuable model for others to emulate for the protection of our fundamental rights.


Vidyaniketan, Thiruvananthapuram

WORKING FOR AND WITH FR. ARRUPE



Providence brought me into a close working relationship with Fr. Arrupe. The General's Curia was looking for a helper to assist Fr. General especially during the 32nd General Congregation. Fr. G. Casimir, who was then our Provincial, sent me to Rome.

After the General Congregation, Fr. Arrupe personally thanked me and told me that he would offer special prayers for my growth in knowledge and

wisdom. Always he treated me with due respect and fraternal love that gave me a tremendous push to work with him cheerfully.

Every day, he used to offer the Holy Mass at 6:00 a.m. in his small chapel which he called his cathedral. I used to serve his Mass. His outspoken and frank approach to various issues and the creative,



challenging and non-traditional positions he took on all issues often got him into trouble with the Vatican Curia officials. He faced very bravely their criticisms but he suffered a lot in silence and never wavered in his obedience to the Pope. Once he asked: "How can I celebrate the Bread of Life, without breaking my life?" He appreciated and encouraged me. Once I was 40 minutes late for Mass. He was patiently waiting for my arrival. After the Mass, he asked me whether I needed more time to take rest; he demonstrated such a fraternal concern about my health and well-being. I, for my part, said I would keep to the same time on a regular basis.

Fr. Arrupe was a man of prayer. Only after a long silence in prayer before the Lord, would he take any important decision.

Fr. Pedro Arrupe was ever a cheerful and happy man. He used to crack jokes now and then and one could see him always with a smiling face. Anyone could meet him freely without prior appointment during the coffee time after lunch. He would attentively listen to his brothers. During my stay in the General Curia, Fr. Arrupe celebrated his Golden Jubilee in the Society. His love and services for the poor, downtrodden and needy people were highlighted. Also mentioned were his immediate and generous interventions after the bombing of Hiroshima on August 6, 1945, the Jesuit Refugee Service that he started and his cheerful administration of the Society of Jesus. Already then I used to consider him as a 'living, joyful and smiling Saint'.

Once after supper, I walked into Fr. Arrupe's room with a financial request for one of my seminary mates who left the seminary and got married to a Protestant widow in Tuticorin. He welcomed me with a smile and offered me a chair to sit and relax. Without a moment's hesitation, he took out the cheque book and signed a cheque for US\$ 500 and at the same time gave his blessings and prayers for my friend.

Once I noticed on our Curia noticeboard a request seeking volunteers who could drive the Sisters of Charity around Rome at night offering bread, milk and warm clothes to the abandoned and needy people. The sisters did not have their own chauffeur-driven vehicle and so they requested the Religious Superiors to take turns and offer a car with a driver once a week. week. I told Fr. Arrupe that I would willingly offer my services going round with the sisters to comfort the needy from 9:00 p.m. till 6:00 a.m. Immediately, Fr. Arrupe blessed me and gave me permission to go and render my services to the poor and needy with the Sisters of Charity. On my return, I used to narrate to him what happened the previous night; he would listen to me attentively and give his blessing saying that I should live for others and serve them cheerfully.

As Fr. Arrupe is now already a 'Servant of God', let us earnestly pray that he would soon be elevated to the rank of a 'Smiling Saint.' Laudetur Iesus Christus!
