BHURKUNDA, CATHOLIC ASHRAM

On June 10th, **Frs. Sushil Lakra**, Socius, and **Francis Marian** and on June 19th **Frs. Santosh Minj Provincial** and **Sushil Lakra** visited Bhurkunda community and consoled the Jesuit brethren after the death of **Fr. Christopher Kerketta** and **Fr. Saju Bastian**. Since June 15th, the teachers have been coming to school regularly and have started online classes. The Middle school teachers have distributed books and rice to the students. The first online unit test was taken, and the teachers have been doing the correction. From the beginning of July, we have community Mass, and the Holy Cross sisters join us for mass. **Frs. Suresh, Sebren, Rajesh, Marianus**, and Sr. Promila accompanied **Fr. Barnabas** and reached him to Bhurkunda safely. **Fr. Xavier Xalxo** was accompanied by **Frs. Primus Kerketta** and **Marianus Tigga**. They were welcomed by a few representatives of Catholic Sabha, Mahila Sangh, and the parish's youth. **Fr. Basant** took **Fr. Barnabas** to different places, introduced him to the people and the place. **Fr. Francis Lopez** moved to Sitagarha in the second week of July after staying a few days in Bhurkunda. **Frs Suman** and **Barnabas** accompanied him to Sitagarha. On July 13th **Fr. Xavier Tigga** came to Bhurkunda to help us with a land problem. On the same day, **Frs. Suman** and **Barnabas**, along with **Fr. Xavier Tigga**, submitted a petition to S.D.O., D.C, and C.O., regarding the land dispute. At the middle of July, **Fr. Basant** accompanied **Barnabas** to Ranchi and introduced him to the Co-operative bank Director. **Fr. Kishore**, too, went with them to Ranchi for some works. From 21st, we started a Novena Prayer to St. Ignatius of Loyola in preparation for the Feast of St. Ignatius. On 22nd **Frs . Barnabas** and **Xavier** went to Patra to get the certificates of **Fr. Xavier Xalxo** for the correction of Aadhar.

On the 31st, we celebrated the feast of St. Ignatius. The celebration was a private affair due to lockdown. Just before the feast, **Fr. Basant** moved to Sitagarha for his tertianship. He was bade farewell by a few representatives of Catholic Sabha, Mahila

Sangh, and the parish's youth on July 25th. Later, the community bade him farewell on July 29th. On this occasion, **Fr. Tej. Kumar Kerketta** from Boitka and Holy Cross Sisters of Bhurkunda were also invited. The next day **Frs Barnabas** and **Suman** accompanied him to Sitagarha. **Frs. Suman** and **Kishore** were busy with the online classes in the school. The teachers too were regularly coming from July. **Frs. Suman** and **Kishore** organized a *Shradhanjali Samaroh* in loving memory of late **Frs. Christopher Kerketta** and **Saju Bastian**, and also two of the working staff we lost during the second wave of Covid-19. On the same day, **Fr. Barnabas** and **Xavier** were welcomed by the school staff. They bade farewell to **Fr. Basant**.

At the end of the month, the 10th class Matric result was published. There were 162 students in the 10th standard. Out of 162 students, 152 got 1st Div. 9, 2nd Div., and 1, 3rd Div. Congrats to **Frs. Suman** and **Kishore** and their team for their hard work.

HAZARIBAG, ARRUPPE NIWAS

Arrupe is partly a study community. **Shyam** is busy with online classes delving into the mysteries of a real assortment of spiritual topics linked with the Bible, taught by different professors in different parts of the world. **Sch. Brother **Patrick Tirkey** was farewelled by the Arrupe Community in the morning Mass on 7th August and was wished all the very best for his ongoing philosophical studies in Satya Nilayam, Chennai.

HAZARIBAG, ST. XAVIER'S

After lockdowns, the school office is open for office work only. The Vice-principals are also attending their offices. For the whole school, online teaching continues. The exam marks for students of Stds 11 and 12 have been sent to CBSE as requested. They will be assessed and marks allotted without exams.

It will stand at the southeast corner of the 'garden of Eden' to greet arrivals coming up the driveway. It will be unveiled and blessed on Loyola Day.

Fr. Bill can now hear you better with his new hearing aids. **Fr. Manoj** visited his doctor

in Calcutta. A good sign was that he was seen on his way to the hall with his badminton racquet on his return. Along with **Fr. Rosner** and **Fr. Ranjit**, our Juniors get plenty of exercise on the court laid out in terrazzo by the late **Bro. Francis Xaxa** in about 1983. Enthusiastic Scrabble and Dominoes brighten up the evening recreation. **Fr. George** gets his relaxation from finance and his house Ministership by several brisk circuits of the compound each evening, overtaking **Fr. Bill**, who manages one circuit at a more sedate pace. **Fr. Raska** has started his new job as a librarian. After feeling that it was time to withdraw for a while from active domestic duties, **Bro. Francis** has again taken care of the kitchen and stores, an office **Fr. Thomas Joseph** filled in for too short a time.

Fr Provincial has suggested that copies of **Fr. Bill's** Hindi translations of the Spiritual Exercises and the Autobiography be made more available to honour the Ignatian year. Xavier Publications published the Autobiography in 2019. **Fr. Bill** had the revised Hindi translation ready for publication in 2020 when Xavier Publications unexpectedly reprinted the 1990 edition. A breakdown in communications awaiting a resolution!

Fr. Bill reports about: Tony Ryan is still pulling his container of oxygen around a lot of the time, and it has been helping him a good deal. In order to know about St. Ignatius and his spirit, the two primary sources are the Spiritual Exercises and the Autobiography. The Universal Apostolic Preferences claim that the Spiritual Exercises are the best means to bring about a renewed Christian life among the people we work with.

The first Universal Apostolic Preference covers the whole of our apostolate - leading

people to God through the Spiritual Exercises. The fourth specifies this as applied to our apostolate among young people.

Hence the need for those who work in schools, universities, and parishes to focus on the faith development of young people and creatively adapt the *Spiritual Exercises* so that young people can personally know Jesus better and follow Him more closely.

By placing the Spiritual Exercises at the disposal of our priests, Fr. Provincial has asked for a revised Hindi translation to be published. It will have the same glossary of suggested Hindi translations of Ignatian terms. The Hindi translation of the Autobiography was published two years ago by Xavier Publications. Both publications will be available in the coming weeks.

The majority of the young people we work with are Hindi speakers with limited familiarity with English. They may have had their whole religious formation in Hindi. Hence we need to talk to them in the Hindi-Ignatian language, using the Spiritual Exercises adapted to them.

PRERANA COMMUNITY

Tony** is on and off to Chatra for meetings. **Fr. Rajendra** directed a retreat for the scholastics at St. Xavier's School. P.T.E.C., SITAGARHA

At PTEC Jesuit community, the months of June and July were full of blessings as the community farewelled some and welcomed another. **Fr. Twenty-seven newly approved scholastics from seven different Provinces arrived at SSC Sitagarha on June 24 and went into

A TRIBUTE TO FR STAN SWAMY SJ

I had met Fr Stan about thirty years ago for the first time and I was glad to know that he was actively involved in social work. I came to know him more closely during the last six 6 years, as I used to go to Bagaicha quite regularly for the training programmes and workshops in relation to Jan Netritva Pahal, Lok Manch and the zonal level social action meetings.

Six years ago, I was quite new to social ministry and was very eager to learn more

about the dynamics of this ministry. In this context, Fr Stan became a living example for my engagement in social apostolate. In my interactions with him, I had not had any lengthy conversations as such with him. But I was lucky to participate in meetings, related to Justice in Mining (JIM), with him. I attended a few workshops, in which he addressed the participants on social issues and motivated them. I used to read his writings. That gave

me an opportunity to know his views and understand his thinking.

I found the following characteristics in him:


1. Well disciplined
2. Prioritizing his works
3. Critical thinking
4. Committed to the marginalised
5. Research oriented
6. Communicating through his writing
7. Punctual
8. Clarity in his thinking
9. Upto date with Acts related to the Social issues and human rights.
10. Every morning, spending time at Pathal Gadi at Bagaicha and praying to God through the intercession of the martyrs and paying respect to them.
11. The ability to be in touch with so many people and influencing them.
12. Special interest towards people's movements.
13. Doing not what pleases others, but doing what pleases God.

He used to spend the morning hours in prayers and reflection. He was a man of few words. He was available for people at any time. He followed the routine strictly. He appreciated my interest towards social work and encouraged me to join the team at Bagaicha. Over these years, I recognized his uncompromising attitude towards any oppressive step taken by the government or officials and he tried to communicate his views to the concerned the persons in various ways.

Fr Stan's preoccupation has been the welfare of the dalits and tribals. He was much disturbed by the decisions of the government, which ignored the PESA Act, according to which no common land can be acquired by the government without the consent of the Gram Sabha. According to the laws, any minerals belonging to the owner of the land but this was not being followed by the government in mining areas. So he

looked for an opportunity to communicate these concerns to the people during the workshops.

I can imagine the amount of sufferings he went through in the jail, being old and sick and not having the necessary basic facilities to lead a life. God continued to bless him to spread his kingdom, even from the jail. He communicated the values of justice and reconciliation all over the nation and the world from the jail more than ever. I am realising the commitment and the sacrifice of the other 15 human rights activists more after Fr Stan's going to jail. Let us continue to pray for all the 15 of them, who are still in custody that they may be freed.



All of us have done our best in order to play our role in getting Fr Stan released from the jail through Friday prayers, other prayers, post card campaigns and other activities. Now that Fr Stan has passed away, we have lost in him an eminent social activist, a person who worked for peace and reconciliation and who accompanied the underprivileged. We continue our campaigns as many other innocent activists are still languishing in the jail. These days zonal, national and international level programs are being organized as condolence and motivational meetings for Fr Stan.

At the province level too, we will organize programs in order to take forward the legacy of Fr Stan; as we get opportunity at various levels. We all will support these activities and take initiative to organise programs in our own centres/institutions. The ashes of Fr Stan was buried at Jamshedpur on 3rd August (30th day) of his passing away.

Fr Stan said, "I am not a silent spectator" and played his prophetic role in bringing peace, justice and reconciliation. Let us not be quiet when unjust things happen but raise our voice for justice and pay the price. May Fr Stan's soul Rest in Peace.

I thank you for joining us online to inaugurate the Ignatian Year 2021 – 22 in Hazaribag Jesuit Province. It is a grace filled year for all of us. The theme for the Ignatian year is 'To see all things new in Christ', invites us to have a new vision of our life and mission. Guided by the theme of the Ignatian year, the Society of Jesus hopes to encourage everyone to draw inspiration from the example of St. Ignatius and his inner struggle to conversion which led him to a close familiarity with God. MESSAGE FOR THE IGNATIAN YEAR HAZARIBAG PROVINCE, 31 JULY 2021

Rt. Rev. Bishop Anand Jojo, the bishop of Hazaribag diocese, and the administrator of Daltonganj Diocese, Fr. Santosh Minj SJ, the provincial of Hazaribag Province, Fr. Rosner Xalxo SJ, the principal of St. Xavier's School Hazaribagh, the staff and students of St. Xavier's School, respected parents, distinguished guests, friends and collaborators of Jesuits and my dear Jesuit companions,

This morning we have gathered here to inaugurate the Ignatian Year to commemorate the defeat that triggered the conversion (transformation) of St Ignatius. For good reasons we are two months behind to inaugurate the Ignatian Year. The celebrations in the Society of Jesus will take place between 20 May 2021 to 31 July 2022.

On 20th of May 500 years ago, Ignatius was wounded by a cannonball, while defending the fort of Pamplona against the powerful French army of 12 thousand, with thousand soldiers. The cannonball not only shattered the bones of his one leg and wounded the other, it blew to pieces also his grandiose dreams to earn name and fame and the admiration of his masters, and the other admirers especially the women of noble birth.

We, in Hazaribag Province, had to defer the date as the 2nd wave of corona virus hit our beloved state of Jharkhand quite hard, infecting scores of people and killing many. Hazaribag Province lost 6 Jesuit companions due to covid-19, apart from the many near and dear ones and collaborators and friends including some priests and religious. Many of us are still trying to come to terms with these losses and are also looking out with anxiety, into the bleak and uncertain future, wondering what is in store for us in the coming months and years. Some are also questioning in their minds, how we could celebrate the Ignatian anniversary, when the prevailing mood is one of despondency, anxiety and uncertainty? But it is my belief that the

Ignatian year, incidentally, coinciding with the pandemic might offer us some spiritual insights and practical wisdom to face our present predicament.

During his long convalescence Ignatius was in a lockdown situation in his bed in the castle of Loyola similar to the situation of the world during the pandemic. His normal life too came to a standstill just as ours. We had to stay at home, work from home, we had to keep social distancing, wear masks, desist from embracing our beloved children; the schools and colleges were closed, so were the factories and all forms of traffic; and the places of business and entertainments, and the places of worship; the roads were empty except for health workers and the ambulances moving around frantically carrying the dead and the dying, many couldn't attend even the last rites of their loved ones. Neither the scientists nor the medical experts could assure us, when this ordeal would end, or what the future has in store for us.

Though Ignatius was confined to his sick bed, he was still hoping to go back to his old 'normal' life. Therefore, in order to kill time he asked for some romantic novels that would fuel his worldly daydreams. But his loving sister-in-law could find only the Life of Christ and a collection of the Lives of Saints in the house. Finding no other way out, to entertain himself, Ignatius spent his time partly in daydreaming about his former worldly life, and partly by recalling to his mind the stories of selfless love and service of the saints he had read. Gradually his mind began to change, it dawned on him that there was a difference in what he felt; though he enjoyed immensely both these activities, the former left him empty and sad afterwards, but the latter filled him with joy and lasting peace and a strong desire to follow them to do great things for God and humanity. After his convalescence, he was determined to pursue this new way. He realized that his former way of life had no lasting value, just as we have realized it during the lockdown.

Ignatius left the castle to pursue this new way, which he believed was God's own way for his future life; and he was ready to pay any price for it, leaving his family, friends, his possessions and his worldly ambitions for name and fame. The cannonball that injured Ignatius had brought a battle to an end, but it would initiate a new interior battle in his soul; it will transform him from a self-seeking individual to a humble servant of God; enlighten him **to see all things from a new perspective**, from a divine perspective. A thing seen as a catastrophe at one moment would turn out to be a moment of grace and personal transformation, to see all things new with the eyes of God!

The little book in which he carefully jotted down his inner pilgrimage is known as the Spiritual Exercises which has been used as God's instrument for personal, community and institutional transformation for the past 500 years. St. Francis Xavier was one of the earliest beneficiaries to experience this transformation. He was sent to India and to the East with the message of God's Love and Service of humanity. Ignatius' conversion also led him to found the Society of Jesus, which has been in the forefront for the Church renewal, spread of modern education and helping the poor and the marginalized in the far-flung corners of the world. Late Fr. Stan Swamy is an epitome in our own days for championing the cause of justice, displacement of the indigenous people and the destruction of the environment especially in the Tribal and Dalit heartlands.

St. Ignatius has also given us two very important methods in the Spiritual Exercises for effective personal, community and institutional transformation, and for making good choices. They are known as the examination of consciousness, and the rules for the discernment of the spirits, or tendencies that are Godly and other-centered or worldly and self-centered. These two precious gifts can help us to make good choices as we embark on the "new normal", to rebuild a fraternal, inclusive and just world. Just as St. Ignatius could not go back to the 'old normal' life, we too cannot go back to the old normal because the present catastrophe, is the cumulative effect of the cutthroat competition, unbridled consumerism and the destruction of the environment.

Prior to the pandemic the SJ had started a process of diagnosing and discerning its life and mission, seeing the sad plight of our society and the environment. After a yearlong process of study, analysis and discernment, the Society of Jesus had come out with 4 universal apostolic preferences. Fr. Arturo Sosa, the superior General of the SJ, presented these to the Pope as the Society's preferences for the next ten years. Pope Francis then approved these and confirmed them. He felt that the SJ had made a true discernment to arrive at these to renew their life and mission in the current deteriorating world situation. Contextually applied with creativity and discernment, these can help us to jumpstart the 'new normal' and rebuild a fraternal, just, ecologically healthy and inclusive society.

Pope Francis has insisted that the foundation for the 'new normal' must start with an internal processes of prayer and discernment as shown by St. Ignatius in the Spiritual Exercises, leading to commitment and solidarity with the poor, migrants, displaced and marginalized people; and accompanying the young by giving them hope for a bright future; providing quality education at all levels without neglecting the poor; restoring the integrity of the cosmos and working for peace and reconciliation in collaboration with all people of goodwill.
