

NEWS FROM ST. XAVIER'S SCHOOL, FORT

Diwali, 'The Festival of Lights' is symbolic of the victory of light over darkness, knowledge over ignorance and good over evil. This Diwali, the lighting of the traditional diya symbolized hope to tide over the gloom of the pandemic.

At Xavier's we've been on with online classes and conducted an online Evaluation to gauge the performance of the students and maintain the tempo of the academic year. Several training sessions for the staff, were held to overcome the anomalies of the first unit test. On 11th November we had an online celebration of Children's Day and Diwali. Various competitions like Rangoli making, diya decoration and card-making were conducted. Music and dance performances were the highlights of the program.

A break from online school and all the gadgetry was needed by all. The Diwali break was from the 12-23 November. Under the guidance of our Principal Sr. Sini, we've planned for extra classes during the vacations to help cover the syllabus for class 10 students. Remedial classes have been planned for the weaker students.

We now look forward to the reopening of schools. As per the government circular, 50% of staff will have to report to school daily. Students of classes 9 and 10 too will have to report to school subject to the consent of their parents. Standard Operating Procedures for reopening will have to be followed.

It's a time of apprehension and anxiety for the teachers, students and parents since the pandemic is still not under control and a spurt in cases is expected post Diwali. But with God on our side and the spirit of St. Francis Xavier to guide us, we know that this too shall pass and we shall overcome.

TIDINGS FROM XTC

Over the past weeks, we were treated to wide ranging experiences which broadened our horizons about what it means to be a Jesuit.



On our visit to the Santibastwad farm, Fr. Joe conducted a seminar on Janajagran (Shramik Abhivrudhi Sangh), an outreach programme which has been actively working for the social up-liftment of people of the area. It has helped construct 30,000 biogas plants in villages, thus reducing pollution to a great extent. It has also set up SHGs for women and vocational courses for girls. The farm is self-sufficient in its energy needs, using solar panels for electricity and biogas for cooking. The slurry generated is used as organic manure.

On 30th October we were visited by Drs. Padmini and Niranjana. Dr. Niranjana spoke about challenges faced by medical professionals during the CoVID-19 outbreak and how we are tackling the issue on a global level. She also instructed us on various precautions and remedial measures. Dr. Padmini spoke to us about the power of Prayer' and narrated several incidents where prayer and constant

communion with God helped her to face different challenges.



We conducted a youth program at Ganeshpur parish based on the theme 'vibrant youth for a vibrant Church'. The sessions included action songs, devotional songs and games. The session about the incarnation of Christ was modified to include the arrest of Fr. Stan Swamy. During the Eucharist, Fr. Anil invited us to always be online with God and alive to our Christian vocation.

On 17th November, the Jesuits in Belagavi arranged a silent protest march against the arrest of Fr. Stan Swamy and other social activists. It was attended by Bishop Derek Fernandes along with several clergy, nuns and lay people. We marched in a disciplined manner to the District Magistrate's office and handed over the protest memorandum to him. The event received good media coverage, and helped raise awareness. During his visitation, the Goa Provincial Fr. Roland Coelho spoke about being men of God through our way of life. He Invited us to find God in all things and especially in the pandemic and the sociopolitical climate of our country.

We visited the Kannada Mission stations of the Goa Province. The Kannada mission is also known as the Swami apostolate. It is a beautiful example of inculturation and amalgamation of local lingayat culture with Christianity. We visited Christ Niwas at Nesargi where we were welcomed by Fr. Tom. Next we visited Torangatti, where Fr. Augustine gave us the history of the Swami apostolate there. At Deshnur, we prayed with Fr. Menino in his ashram interacted with several orphan boys who reside in the hostel there. The visit made

us aware of the term 'vocation within a vocation' and inspired us to be more creative in our ministries. We are grateful to our Formators and the Society for all the rich experiences we had.

Reaching out across borders Mahim to JRS Afghanistan



The trainees have two weeks of theory classes and a week's project work. Google Classroom and WhatsApp groups were created to facilitate interaction with the staff and provide trainees access to course materials. Despite the challenges of security risks and limited internet access, the trainees have been fully engaged and are regular in attendance.


classes are very important for Computer Science students, who eagerly look forward to continue learning in the next semesters as well."

Fr. Rudolph Fernandez SJ 21 Jan 1934 – 16 Nov 2020



THE SAINT OF SMALL THINGS

I hardly knew Fr. Rudy before I came to the shrine in June 2018. Maybe about 5 passing sentences exchanged over about 56 years. Just two and a half years with him here, and I wish I had met him earlier in my life as a Jesuit. I would have learned so much from his vast store of knowledge his wisdom, his practical sense and his example of simplicity and humility. If I were to write his biography, it would have been titled "The Saint of Small things".

He might have been small in stature or the way he considered himself in comparison with others, but he was really BIG in unassuming holiness, virtue and unstinted service to others. Most of us have to die to go to heaven. Not so Rudy. He quite lived it while he spent his life as a Jesuit here on earth. Missionary and pastoral work in the districts almost his whole life... with three stints as Socius to the Novice Master.

And in all of these, concern, care, dedication and service to all those under his charge - novices, parishioners, pilgrims and the simple poor who came to him for help. He continued his ministries here in the Shrine - confessions, bible study groups and meeting people after mass right up to lockdown times. Really, a saint in small things.

He was an avid reader - books, newspapers, magazines and anything printed he could lay his hands on. He had a good memory for all that he read, sharing from his store of information many items that we may not even have wanted to know! He would encourage me to read, especially Marathi. "Vaachal tar vaachal..." he would say to me often till I finally found out what it meant and could recite it myself!

He would almost leap in response to a service need that one of us would have - even to wash the plates of all of us who were so much younger than him. I remember him once going all the way to the market to buy a bucket for a community member. He was funny too, expressing his humour in rhymes and puns over and over again. "Die-with-ease" he would say to any of us who would mention diabetes that four in the community had. If one of us asked him to pass the butter at table he would say "make the bitter butter better". And so on endlessly.

He always wanted to have the last word in any disagreement he might have had over all and sundry. I remember once asking him: "If the plural of goose is geese, what is the plural of mongoose?" He was thinking about that for a while and I answered for him, "not mongeese but mongooses!" Pat came his last word answer,"Not always!!" I once commented to

him: "Rudy, you always want to have the last word..." He looked at me with a mischievously wicked smile and said nothing. Point taken!

And his last words said softly to Fr. Assis who went to visit him a little while before he passed away were: "Give the community my best wishes". He said this thrice... He was a good simple man and a wonderful Jesuit. He had a great love for the Society and had a burning desire to meet the early Fathers. His wish has been granted and he has gone home.

We will miss him and his always-there striped sling bag, and his walking stick that had the habit of regularly falling down with a bang in the middle of our evening adoration prayer.

Good-bye Rudy. Now you give our best wishes to all the saints in heaven.
