I am convinced that this is one of the most urgent calls to the Society of Jesus in our times; it is a clear invitation to us to come closer to the Lord's own way of life. The Ignatian year 2021-2022, will therefore be for us a privileged occasion to hear the cry of the poor, the excluded, and those whose dignity has not been respected, in all the diverse social and cultural circumstances in which we live and work. It is a listening which moves our hearts and compels us to draw closer to the poor, to walk with them in seeking justice and reconciliation. CONVOCATION OF THE 71ST CONGREGATION OF PROCURATORS

"I CONVOKE THE 71ST CONGREGATION OF PROCURATORS WHICH WILL START ON 16 MAY 2022."

In a letter sent on 15 January 2021 to all Major Superiors, Fr. Arturo Sosa announces the holding of this important meeting of the universal Society. It will be held in Loyola and will be preceded by a week of Spiritual Exercises, that according to the wishes of the Superior General, will allow the delegates "to attend more deeply to the Holy Spirit who is active in our Society." An announcement 16 months in advance, isn't it a bit early?

No, it isn't! A Congregation of Procurators brings together delegates from each of the administrative units of the Society, Provinces and Regions (to which this time Fr. General adds the two "missions" of Myanmar and Cambodia). They must be elected in a Provincial (or Regional) Congregation and they have the duty to visit Jesuits and Jesuit works in order to prepare a picture of the situation of the Society in their Provinces (Regions) and to answer questions that the General suggests to them for further discussion during the meeting. Such an assembly therefore requires a long preparation.

History and raison d'être

A bit of history to situate this event: The Congregation of Procurators was not foreseen in the Constitutions. But it was the 2nd General Congregation, already in 1565, which created it. Without going into detail, we can say that from the very beginning of the Society there was a need for more frequent meetings at the universal level than those of the General Congregations, which were to take place especially when a General died. It was therefore thought that a meeting of the "Procurators" could be held every three years. Later it was decided that it would take place every four years and that it would alternate with another body created much more recently, the Congregation of Provincials.

The first role of the Congregation of Procurators is to decide whether a General Congregation should be convoked, after having informed Father General of the "state of the Society." From the 31st GC (1965-66) another purpose was added: to deal

with important matters at the level of the universal Society. This greatly expanded its role. One advantage of this meeting is that it allows a representation of the 'grass roots' of the Society, since the Procurators - who have to prepare themselves by visiting their Province or Region - are not Provincials or Major Superiors. The latter have other opportunities to express their views to Father General.

Anecdotally, we can note that several Congregations of Procurators have had to be cancelled over the centuries, once because of the illness of the General, four times because of epidemics, seven times because of wars or European social tensions. The COVID-19 pandemic is not the first ordeal that the Society has experienced at the universal level!

For 2022, then?

In his letter of convocation, Father Sosa situates the next Congregation of Procurators within the framework of the Ignatian Year, with the same theme: "Seeing all things new in Christ." More specifically, he writes: "the Congregation can be a time when we examine together the lights and shadows of the Society, the particular challenges that face us, and action of the Holy Spirit, who calls us to ever greater generosity in the service of Church and our world. There is no doubt that one of the greatest challenges that our world faces is Covid 19, whose consequences will continue to be with us for the foreseeable future."

With regard to the issues that the Superior General asks the Provincial Congregations to deal with and on which the Procurators will have to report, the first is the follow-up given to the broad project of the *Universal Apostolic Preferences*, paying particular attention, according to the wishes of Pope Francis, to the first one, that of "showing the way to God with the help of the Spiritual Exercises and discernment." And secondly, the Ignatian youth ministry and the link with the promotion of Jesuit vocations.

Here we are; the table is set! The Provincial Congregations must meet within a year to elect their Procurator. They are to prepare their report on the state of the Society in their own area and prepare answers to Father General's questions before arriving in Loyola at the beginning of May 2022. Eighty-seven participants are expected to

attend, including Father General and his Assistants.

New Provincial for the Province of United States West (UWE):

Father General appointed Fr. Sean O. Carroll, SJ, 54 years old, as the next Superior Provincial of the United States West Province. This Province was created in 2017 when the former Provinces of Oregon and California were united. While Fr. Carroll's work has included both educational and parish ministry, he is best known for his involvement with migrants in the *Kino Border Initiative*, a work under the leadership of six religious congregations on both sides of the US-Mexico border. Sean Carroll has been the director for more than ten years. He will assume his duties as Provincial, replacing Fr. Scott Santarosa, on 31 July 2021.


can meet, share, listen and be guided in the right direction. We wish him well in this ministry.

XAVIER FARM, MACCHE

The year 2020, in spite of Covid-19, was a blessing to all of us here at SAS (Shramik Abhivrudhi Sangh). Though all the planned activities could not be implemented, SAS could serve the most needy and disadvantaged people during the lockdown and after. SAS staff walked the extra mile to meet the needs of stranded people due to the lockdown and Covid-19 related restrictions. They approached the *Gram Panchauats* to start community kitchens. They distributed masks and groceries to the poor people. The migrants from the neighboring states and cities got an opportunity to work under MGNREGA, even in the absence of the mandatory documents to prove that they were from the Panchayat. Thus the migrants earned their livelihood with dignity. SAS staff also made sure that the primary health centers provided emergency health services, especially to pregnant women.

In December, SAS planned its activities for the year 2021 keeping in mind its sanctioned projects and the Universal and Goa Province Apostolic Preferences of the Jesuits. On 29th December, SAS celebrated Christmas with its staff and honored Mrs. Sunanda Anandache, who completed 25 years of service with SAS. From June to December, SAS worked hard to catch up with the activities it missed out during the lockdown. SAS formed 55 new SHGs (Self-Help Groups) with 799 members and animated and guided 928 SHGs with 14759 members and 64 Functional Vocational Training Centers with 677 adolescent village girls across 180 villages. SHG members were empowered to take active part in *Gram Panchayat* elections - 71 SHG members contested the GP elections and 38 of them got elected. SAS had to its credit 567 biogas cum toilet units and as a result 2835 persons were added to the number of persons who enjoyed the benefits of smokeless kitchens and the use of their own toilets. SAS's work among the traditional shepherds and other works continued with reduced funds and staff.

This year was blessed with a bumper crop of sugarcane, sweet potato and rice. Vella's sweat and blood keeps the farmhouse and the surrounding areas spick and span — a witness to 'ecological conversion', whereby the effects of one's encounter with Jesus Christ becomes evident in his relationship with the world around him (Laudato Si# 217).

Examinations for Std I to VIII were held online. The students had to later submit their answer sheets (hard copies) to the school for assessment. It was decided later by the Directorate of Education that the examinations for Std IX should be held offline. This caught many students off guard and this is noticed in their performances; probably they were eagerly waiting to answer these examinations online and be able to use ways and means to inflate their scores. Now they have some introspection to do and a problem up their sleeves.

Jimmy's toil and sweat in the backyard has been bearing fruit; even the staff is eyeing them. On the other hand we are enjoying a rich harvest of papayas.

NEWS FROM PORTUGAL

It is a month now since I moved to the Seminary. Things here at Aveiro, at least the first 15days of January, before Portugal went into another "strict lockdown" had been quite different, which helped me a lot in the process of my adapting.

Since I live in the University Campus, I have been able to meet up with my guide at her University office, whenever she has some free time to give me private classes (in English), which otherwise she does online in Portuguese.

We have now finished our First Semester entirely online, but it is very uncertain as to when the second semester would resume, since the pandemic is creating havoc in Portugal. However, as a part of my completion of the First Semester, I am expected to write two papers, which are presently underway. Simultaneously, I am also working with my guide on the preliminary text of the PhD in view of applying for the scholarship.

Both the priests living in this minor seminary (with no seminarians) interact with me in English,

specially at the meals time. This daily interaction has helped me a lot. Besides, I do get to meet and interact with a few students that attend daily Eucharist at the CUFC's (Centre for Universal Faith and Culture), which I concelebrate in Portuguese. The scope for English Mass has still not opened. In fact, for now, even CUFC'c is shut down.

Portugal has now declared a "state of emergency" from 15th January to 15th February. The schools, colleges, universities, churches, private institutions like CUCF's, etc., everything is shut down. With the UK, Brazil and South African variants entering Portugal, they are unable to control the spread. Last week, the Seminary too had a case of Covid Positive, the Rector's secretary. The Rector has now gone into "self-isolation" and we two into "strict confinement"

within the seminary walls.

The present circumstances are very scary, setting in a lot of fear and anxiety. However, I seek to find strength in my own prayer and the prayerful support from many others to encounter this unfamiliar and unpredictable scenario of being confined indoors with very little interaction and most of all not knowing what comes next.
