


A TRIBUTE TO FR. STAN SWAMY, S.J.

On behalf of the Madhya Pradesh Province and its members, I pay homage and offer tribute to Fr. Stan Swamy, a prophet, a hero, a champion and a martyr of the marginalized.

Truly, Fr. Stan Swamy was a hero and a champion of the rights and dignity of the tribals of Jharkhand and the neighbouring states. He dedicated his entire life for the emancipation of the underprivileged and the marginalized. He was a silent but fearless campaigner for tribal rights and tribal upliftment.

Fr. Stan Swamy will be remembered for many things but particularly for the following four contributions through which he defended the rights and dignity of the tribals.

- 1. He voiced for the full and proper implementation of the Fifth Schedule of the Constitution, which stipulated setting up of a Tribal Advisory Council whose members will be solely from the adivasi community for their protection, well-being and development.
- 2. He challenged the 'indiscriminate' arrest of thousands of young advisees falsely labelled as "Naxals". He filed a public interest petition in the High Court of Jharkhand for their release.
- 3. He opposed the setting up of 'land banks' which would deprive the tribals from their community land and forest in favour of industries and mining.
- 4. He opposed the rampant displacement of tribals in the name of one-sided development.

Fr. Stan was a peaceful man and always looked for peaceful settlement of the problems following the path of justice, peace and reconciliation.

His final days and months were very painful. They will remind us of many things that are horribly wrong with our governance and justice system. On the grounds of his age and deteriorating health he moved the court repeatedly with bail petitions but the court remained deaf to his plea. He was denied of even the minimum facility like simple sipper and straw to drink water. I do hope that the law makers and the people in judiciary will review the draconian law and make it people-oriented.

Today, Fr. Stan Swamy is not with us physically, but his legacies will keep him alive for decades and centuries. With his death he is sown into the ground but he will rise in the form of his followers who will carry forward his unfinished works. May God reward him with an eternal life and may his soul rest in peace.



Campion School, Bhopal

The summer of 2021 was unique in the sense that all the programmes that of the Province get together and home visits were cancelled due to the Corona pandemic. All the Fathers and Scholastic were obligated to stay in the community and spend the holidays and engage in different activities. But it was a blessing in disguise to spend the holidays together in different and meaningful ways; it was like what they called in the olden days of the Society- a quinzaine, but a longer one. This certainly cemented the community bonding.

We had a fishing spree in our ponds. Thrice in May, the entire community was near and around the pond of AICUF. Together with the workers of the campus, some Fathers dragged the net full of fish, others cleaned them, and Sisters and the cooks fried them. The community had great days of picnics. It was a reminiscing experience of the Gospel after the resurrection of Jesus.

As per the instruction of the Provincial that during the Corona pandemic each community should be self-reliant by making use of the farm and land by growing vegetables and animal husbandry, Fr. Blacius whose hobby is hunting and fishing provided the community with varieties of non-vegetable items. Frs. Amritlal, Christi, Kapil, and the A.C. Sisters of the campus have planted some 60 kilos of ginger in the garden of their units. We hope to have a bumper crop in its season. Fr. Alok has beautified his Ashram with the rarest of trees and plants. Fr. Athnas applied every means to collect the school fees as during corona many were defaulters; he motivated the teachers by orientation seminars. Fr. Panka, following the example of Fr. Alok, levelled the ground in front of Loyola Niwas and planted some trees alongside the roads. Fr. Kalyan pursued his M.A, studies in Psychology to take profit of his stay here and Sch. Naveen knocked on every nook and corner of Bhopal to obtain his passport and visa to fly to Italy for his theological studies. All the Fathers and Scholastic took precautions against the Corona pandemic by doing physical exercises through games and brisk walks and increased the immunity power.

This year, we had a bumper crop of mangoes and *Jamun* in our campus. Our preoccupation was how to save the mangoes from the destructive bats that are thousands here in Bhopal. But the innovative ideas of Frs. Amritlal and Blacius to put bat nets and flood the entire mango grove with electric lights warded them off and we enjoyed plenty of mangoes. Fr. Amritlal prepared some *Jamun* wine and claimed that the wine could be as good as that of the wedding at Cana in the Gospel.

XIDAS, Jabalpur

The Strategic Plan workshop was held at XIDAS, Jabalpur. Fr. Alexius Ekka, Director, briefed the house about the contributions of Fr. Michael Van den Bogaert at XISS, XIMB, and how he initiated XIDAS. Dr. Namrata Vasudeo Jasrotia, in her presentation, highlighted the vision and mission of XIDAS for the last 25 years under different leaderships. Fr. Fr. Dharam Kishore Lakra gave his presentation of Universal Apostolic Preferences (UAP) and Province Apostolic Preferences (PAP) and the vision-mission statements of the Province.

He also briefed the house about the translation of Universal Apostolic Preferences (UAP) and Province Apostolic Preferences (PAP) through different initiatives and activities to be implemented in the Madhya Pradesh province.

Fr. Sanjay Kujur spoke to the house about Jesuit Higher Education in Madhya Pradesh Province. He briefed the house about the preamble and Vision-Mission of Jesuit Higher Education in Madhya Pradesh. In his presentation, he also highlighted how the PAP will be translated and implemented into the Institute of Higher Learning in Madhya Pradesh Province. The activities mentioned were very relevant and appropriate.

Fr. Binod Toppo gave the last presentation of the day. He spoke about the XIDAS Action Plan in detail and how the Institute will implement the PAP by initiating various meaningful activities throughout the year for the next 10 years. The activities were mainly focused on 8 thrust areas, for example, sensitizing the stakeholders about the Vision and Mission of Jesuit Characteristics of Education, Human Rights, CSR Interventions, Personality Development Sessions, Ecological Conservation, Clean and Green Villages, Peace and Reconciliation, Celebration of Festivals, Panel Discussions and Visitation of the Poor Families of other religions.

Dr. Uma C. Saha Dean, chaired the session and made it very lively and a lot of discussions and clarifications were made.

Fr. Ranjit Tigga, Provincial, chaired the session. Dr. Namrata Vasudeo gave a brief report of the Vision-Mission Statement of XIDAS for the last 25 years and proceeding of both days. Dr. Uma C. Saha presented the Perspectives & Requisites of Vision -Mission Statement very elaborately and comprehensively.

Fr. Alexius Ekka in his presentation briefly gave examples of Vision-Mission of many prestigious Institutes and organisations in India to the audience. This gave the house an idea of how the Vision and Mission are formulated.

Dry ration (Rice, Dal, Flour, Soyabadi, edible oil, sanitizer, pea, spice) was distributed to 100 households funded by CCBI Commission for Migrants Rs. 1,00,000/- (one lakh only) to the neediest ones and with special preference to migrants. Thanks to the commission secretary Fr. Jaison Vadassery and the President Rev. Bishop Henry V. Thakur, DD.

A write-up was published in the newspaper on Birsa Munda on the occasion of his 121 death anniversary, 9th June 1900. Lok Manch staff and the Ashadeep community paid homage to the tribal hero. Fr. Robert Tigga was the Chief Guest who in his message highlighted the contribution he made to tribal liberation. Mr. Hemant Lakra read out his life sketch and Fr. Yacub Kujur explained the tribal situation caused due to so-called "development". Mr. Joachim Toppo proposed a vote of thanks.

After long-awaited and hard work JVM, received the FCRA bank account number from SBI Delhi and its approval from MHA. Thanks to staff members for their hard work.

On 23rd June, some community members got a second dose of Covishield. On the same day Fr. Yacub along with Lok

Manch staff and nurse Celecian Minj, the in-charge of Covid treatment of Pathalgaon block, visited six villages-Diwanpur, Tihlisarai, Thelupara, Sureshpur, Bahnatangar, and Kunkuri to encourage and motivate people for vaccination. In this way, JVM collaborated with Government Department on various issues.

25th and 26th June were grace-filled days for the community when Rev. Fr. Provincial made his visitation.

St. Xavier's English Medium, Bandiakhar, Pathalgon Building is coming up with its new look with 2nd floor Eastern and Northern wing from the basement up to 2nd floor. During lockdown, the work was still on despite the little hurdle in



purchasing the required building materials. During this pandemic time no schools but several good works in the campus were done for instance *Jhula* and play kits for children were installed and a new carpet grass mini garden has come up in St. Xavier's English Medium, School. At the back of the main school building, the jungle was cleaned up and converted into a new playground keeping in mind the CBSC requirements in the future. It was though extremely unlawful for a citizen. Thank God no complaints reached to the government officials and media lest the situation should have been worse. The members of the



community were so far keeping fine untouched by covid-19. Fr. Dino Toppo, S.J. expressed his gratitude towards the St. Xavier's community on his farewell Holy Mass on May 7 and the next evening moved to his new mission assigned to him. The community was highly indebted to him for his

contribution to the community and wished him for his better forthcoming undertakings.

Fr. Vipin Kishore Tirkey participated twice in a Zoom international meeting (CLC Asia-Pacific Meet 2021) in preparation for the Ignatian Year. It was very enriching experience for him by interacting with worldwide spread CLC members. Most of the participants were lay people who very closely followed the Ignatian Spirituality. For the next legal proceedings, some of our Jesuit representatives met Deputy Collector Mr. Neelam Toppo, Ambikapur regarding the same case. The further legal proceedings are on.

Two days orientation programme for St. Xavier's English Medium, Bandiakhar teaching staff was organized on 20 & 22



June under the able guidance of Fr. Alphonse Tirkey, as the resource person. It was a very enriching experience for the teachers to understand the life of St. Ignatius Loyola and his contribution along with the Ignatian way of proceedings in the field of education. The participants were highly enthused to carry on their services as a teacher to mould the students for better humanitarian society.

JESUIT MISSION IN MP Article 39

When writing to the Archbishop on 2nd November1911, Fr. Van den Driessche enters into more details as he was on tour. His letter is dated from Gorea: "From Mahuatoli, from where I wrote to Your grace on 15th October, I visited successively Bachhram, Kalea, Sarabkombo, Betra, Ubka, Bhandea, Budhadand, Musgutri, Ghughri, Marol, Saraipani, Basen Koldeah. Your Grace will be glad to hear that I found everywhere our Christians as well disposed, as confident in us and as steady as during my last visit in March. There were only 2 places: Butunga near Kalea and Dakdau'a near Budhadand, where the people through fright did no more dare to go to make girja. In Butunga, I was received as usual, all the people came to me and I had a good chat with them, men, women and children. Today I hear from the Pracharak of Kalea, that Butunga makes again girja. Deo Gratias! In Dakdau'a they seemed to be more afraid, although they assured me that they had not become pagans, and finally promised to go to girja as before."

"In all other places where I passed, there is not an appearance of even an inclination to be shaky. This is manifestly the work of our Lord. He alone can keep them steady in the present circumstances, for the rascals have not yet given up the idea of perverting our Christians. Just when I was going to enter Bhandea, I was informed that the ganjhu, who is at the same time a kind of Daroga, had ordered the Christians to plant the karam, threatening to expel them from the village, if they refused. I was told that he even threatened to shoot them! The youngsters told me that he would profit of this pagan feast to make the Christians "eat the rice" i.e. to make them pagans. I called the ganjhu and after the sermon I gave him, he went away like a dog holding the tail between the legs and did not plant the karam!" He also says that in several places threats are used to force

the Christians to plant the karam.

The Archbishop had asked the 3 Fathers working in Jashpur, to send in a report regarding the losses sustained through this vehement persecution. Fr. Van den Driessche's answer is dated 9th November 1911. Since a short time before, he had been able to announce the good news that Sarbahla and Khutitoli on Kastura side, had agreed to come back and accept a catechist, the losses now amounted to one village only Jemna (Jamuna) near Tapkara. This happened at the end of July, and the Raja's people had done it more cleverly than in Kastura. They Induced the Christians to write a petition to the Raja, to ask him to accept them again as pagans! But a little later Jemna (Jamuna) was completely Catholic. Thank God, no other villages have even temporarily abandoned. He had first explained to the Archbishop how Saraitoli, Khutitoli and Sarbahla, temporarily shaky had already come back. He had also heard that the Khadia quarter of Kastura, called Khadiatoli, wanted to come back; but as they had stupidly taken loan in Nagar, they were made to suffer for it. They eventually returned to the Faith.

The Father spent the greater part of the Rainy seasons of 1912 and the 2 consecutive years, under a tent at Ginabahar. Anxiety to be nearer his persecuted Christians, induced him to sacrifice the greater comforts of Kurdeg bungalow, for the hardships of that tent-life, in full Rainy season. When he reached the month of August 1912, he could look back on 8-10 months of comparative quiet and peace for the Christians under him. Evidently the frequent correspondence, and subsequent interviews, between the Archbishop on the one hand and the higher authorities of the Central Provinces on the other, must have found some echoes in Jashpur, and will have kept on the alert the local administration. But, as happened before the effect of these warnings did not endure long.

Writing from his tent in Ginabahar, on 10 August 1912, the Father informs the Archbishop that as regards himself "things are going on splendidly." As regards the country "The situation is pretty quiet since several months, but I think there is very little change in the disposition of the Jashpur authorities. Last month I wrote to the Raja to inform him that a Christian had been kept bound to a stake for 2 hours by 2 thikedars, because he was going to make girja. The answer came to this: you are not a party, we cannot act. It is the answer they gave before, when they did answer!" The 2 thikedars were Ghadda of Kharijharia and Charku of Barangjor. The Christian was Lohra of Barangjor. After having kept him bound for 2 hours in the full sun, they made him sign a muchilka promising not to go to girja any more, under penalty of Rs. 50/- and 50 jutas (beatings with a shoe, considered very dishonorable). The Father added another complaint: "These 2 thikedars force the Christians to work *begari* on Sundays, prevent them from assisting at the Sunday Service, and from sending their children to school."

The Raja's answer directing the aggrieved part to have recourse to the courts, is dated 22nd July 1912. In addition there is: "If any of the Christians have any general complaint either religious or temporal against respective thikedars, they may representation to the proper state authority so that proper action could be taken thereupon. Or if you yourself have any general complaint against any of them, you may inform the Raja Bahadur or his Diwan of the same, in doing which, you are requested to kindly act upon sufficient and direct information, and not on exaggerated and distorted second hand reports." This was stated by A. Bagehi, Private Secretary, to the Raja Bahadur, Jashpur State. The last sentence is significant of what they thought of Fr. Van den Driessche's complaints!!

Incidentally he makes a very just remark, from his experience of living with the people during the rains: "My stay here during the rains, has shown me once more how necessary it is to have village chapels. I think that on most Sundays during the rains, no chapel means no Sunday gathering. Will they gather in the rain, or at least in a wet plot of ground without even a shed to shelter them? I am quite ready to go on living in a tent, but if we could at least have chapels for our people!" One may not forget that in the Heth Ghat, most of the villages are thickly populated, and that no private house could accommodate even a 10th part of the necessary Sunday attendance. Yet the people wished more for a permanent residence of the Father, among them, than for chapels. The reason was the protection they felt from his presence among them. "Your Grace knows that the chief reason why I wished to remain in Jashpur even during the rains, is to convince our Christians, that we want to do for them all what is humanly possible."

Relative peace continued for some time, after the Rainy season, during the 5 weeks of his touring. The ordinary vexation, begari, adhbatti etc. went on as usual. He wrote again on 2nd November1912, and stated that just then they were trying to force on the Christians the celebration of Karam, a purely pagan festival. It is the feast of fecundity celebrated by young men and girls unmarried. Last year they had already put on coercion for the occasion. "I have been told that someone goes about exhibiting a paper which he pretends to be an order of the Raja, under penalty of fine, to celebrate that feast. Today the preacher of Kurkunga tells me that at the last bazaar of Narainpur, the order was proclaimed publicly. I told him to try and see that paper, but I doubt whether it will be shown." In the next letter, 27th November, he says that the so called order has been proclaimed only in some slack villages, where probably they would have celebrated the Karam all the same, even without the order. Hence better keep quiet about it.

Violence at Ginabahar: Three weeks later, the Father showed that the relative peace had again been turned into "open persecution." On 27th November he informs the Archbishop that Tippu Sikar, gomoshta, has confiscated a dand of Ledha, Ginabahar; because he was keeping the tent of the Father in his house, after the latter had left. On 26th, the Father heard that Ledha was threatened with the loss of another field, this time doin (low field) which since 20 years is in his possession. Ledha belongs to the chief family of Bartoli, a tola of Ginabhar, where the Father had pitched his tent. During the whole rainy season, no one tried to molest Ledha. The reason advanced why they are at him now, is that he has called the Father to Ginabahar. "To me the conclusion seems evident: they attack Ledha, but they aim at me; they want to make my staying at Ginabahar impossible. If they succeed at Ginabahar, there is no reason why the same means of confiscation would not render impossible my staying anywhere else. The Raja cannot directly prevent me as long as I live under the tent, but the indirect means he employs now, might prove very efficacious. The brave people of Ginabahar although they understand very well that I am the occasion of these vexations (they have told them so explicitly) - in no way seem disposed to ask me to go elsewhere; on the contrary they insist on my returning to Ginabahar as soon as possible." The Father then states that he held the October and November tatikhs (monthly Pracharak meeting) there and will hold there the one of December too, and celebrate also Christmas. "That will help, I think to make the Raja understand that if we cannot acquire concessions, at any rate we are decided not to give up any of our rights."
