Jesuits Launch a Special Year of Renewal

On 20 May, the Ignatian Year of the Society of Jesus began. This year the Jesuits celebrate a very strange event: the wounding of their founder Ignatius of Loyola at a battle in Pamplona in 1521. That event changed the course of his life; it led to the foundation of the Society of Jesus which in turn provoked dramatic changes in the Church and in the history of Catholicism.

What is celebrated?

The Jesuits are celebrating the 500th anniversary of the conversion of St. Ignatius of Loyola. It was a different kind of conversion. He went from being a vain nobleman focused on worldly success and fame to being the founder of the largest Catholic religious order. God gave the world and the Church a precious gift through Ignatius: a spirituality that helps to follow the Spirit in all circumstances of life.

Why this celebration?

Celebrating 500 years of the conversion of St. Ignatius is not primarily about the past. It is about the present and the future. It is an opportunity for renewal and rediscovery of the Ignatian roots. It is an opportunity to stop, take stock and put Christ in the centre again. It is about continual and daily conversion.

Fr. General Arturo Sosa says:

“It is good to remind ourselves that the wound Ignatius suffered in Pamplona was not so much a happy ending, but rather a happy beginning. Conversion consists sometimes of great moments of change, but it is also a never-ending process. We need to put Christ in the centre every time, again and again. This process is a pilgrimage along winding roads, up and down, sometimes having to retrace our steps, sometimes feeling lost. But meeting peo-

ple along the road who indicate the way and reach out their hands to us.

This Ignatian Year is a pilgrimage of conversion. Pope Francis, in his recent book *Let Us Dream*, says a pilgrim is someone “who decentres and so can transcend. She goes out from herself, opens herself to a new horizon, and when she comes home she is no longer the same, and so her home won’t be the same. This is a time for pilgrimages.”

We want to set out on the road, letting ourselves be guided gently by the Holy Spirit, centring our lives ever more on Christ and allowing ourselves to see all things new in Christ.

About Ignatius, Pope Francis said to the Society of Jesus:

All through his life he converted, [...] he put Christ in the centre. And he did so through discernment. Discernment is not about always getting it right from the start, but it’s rather about navigating, about having a compass to be able to set out on the road which has many twists and turns, but always letting oneself be guided by the Holy Spirit who leads us to an encounter with the Lord.

Who is celebrating?

The initiative of this Ignatian Year comes from Fr. General Arturo Sosa of the Society of Jesus (the Jesuits). But he extends the invitation to everyone, and in particular to all those inspired by the Ignatian spirituality - the larger Ignatian family.

“There is a lot of collaboration with female Ignatian congregations and lay Ignatian organisations such as Christian Life Community (CLC)” says Fr Sosa. “In fact most of the initiatives and events take place on a local level, all around the globe, and are a collaboration between Jesuits and others. That is something we value tremendously.”

COVID RESPONSE REPORT



In spite of strict prohibitory order and limited means and resources, Nepal Region and its units are reaching out to the most needy .

■ **St. Xavier's School Deonia** has distributed dry ration kits to 339 families in Birtamode Municipality, Godamara, Mechinagar Municipality and Bhadrapur Municipality, Jhapa in East Nepal.

■ **St. Xavier's School Godavari** has prepared a database of students and parents needing different supports. The school donated Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), Sanitizer, Face Shields, Masks and Gloves to Badegaun Police Station. The school conducted PCR tes for the staff.

■ **St. Xavier's School Jawalakhel** distributed dry ration kit to 29 needy families. The school has offered its physical facilities for the accommodation of relatives and attendants of patients admitted in nearby hospitals, like Sumeru Hospital.

■ **St. Xavier's College** continues to feed the patients and their relatives at Teku Hospital, Bir Hospital, the street children and beggars around Mahakal



Temple, Bhadrakali Temple and rickshaw pullers around Bashantapur Square. Everyday college is feeding around 200 people twice a day. The food is prepared at the college canteen and the student volunteers helped in the distribution. A Tele-medicine help desk is also being set up.

■ **The Region Office** has set up a Tele-Helpline Desk. Through it, the Region Office has provided dry ration kit to 213 needy families including 60 families of visually and physically disabled persons in three districts of Kathmandu valley. It has also provided dry ration kits to 20 families of daily wage workers and victims of gender violence in Kohalpur, Nepalgunj, West Nepal. Salvation Nepal Rehabilitation Centre Bainsipati where 20 inmates are residing received dry ration kits from Nepal Region Office.

■ **Parishes:** St. Ignatius parish Baniyatar, St. Ann's parish, Pokhara, St. Xavier's parish Maheshpur and Sadakbari / Simalbari parishes stream live online Mass on Saturdays and they have online Rosary and other prayers.

results of classes 1 to 7 and 9 were published through the school app on May 26, 2021. With this, the academic year 2020-21 got completed. In spite of ambiguity and difficulties teachers, students and parents worked hard and made the academic year successful. However, PRE-BLE (Basic Level Examination) of class 8 will have online assessment from May 28 to June 2, 2021 and PRE-SEE examination of class 10 will start from June 8, 2021.

On 20 May community members watched together the Ignatian Year inauguration program of St. Xavier's college on a bigger screen. Fr. George P.M. also delivered a message on the occasion of the Ignatian Year inaugural program. We inaugurated and opened the Ignatian year with the Holy Eucharist in the community. Due to the lock-down our school children were not around hence the students didn't have active participation in the inaugural program of Ignatian year. However, we are optimistic to have some programs for Ignatian year when school opens.

We are planning to put up some online programs also.

St. Xavier's school offered the school's physical facilities to Sumeru hospital for COVID patients. Fr. George approached some of the doctors of Sumeru hospital but the shortage of oxygen cylinders proved to be the biggest obstacle for expanding and utilizing the school's physical facilities. The school also distributes dry ration kits to needy families during lock-down. Fr. George P.M. and Br. Hermon Anthony keep track of the ration distribution of the needy people.

Fr. George, Fr. Ignatius and Br. Hermon got the second dose of vaccine whereas the first dose of vaccine was given to Fr. Tomson and Fr. Sanjay. Since Fr Anil is in Baniyagar he couldn't come for vaccination. Fr.

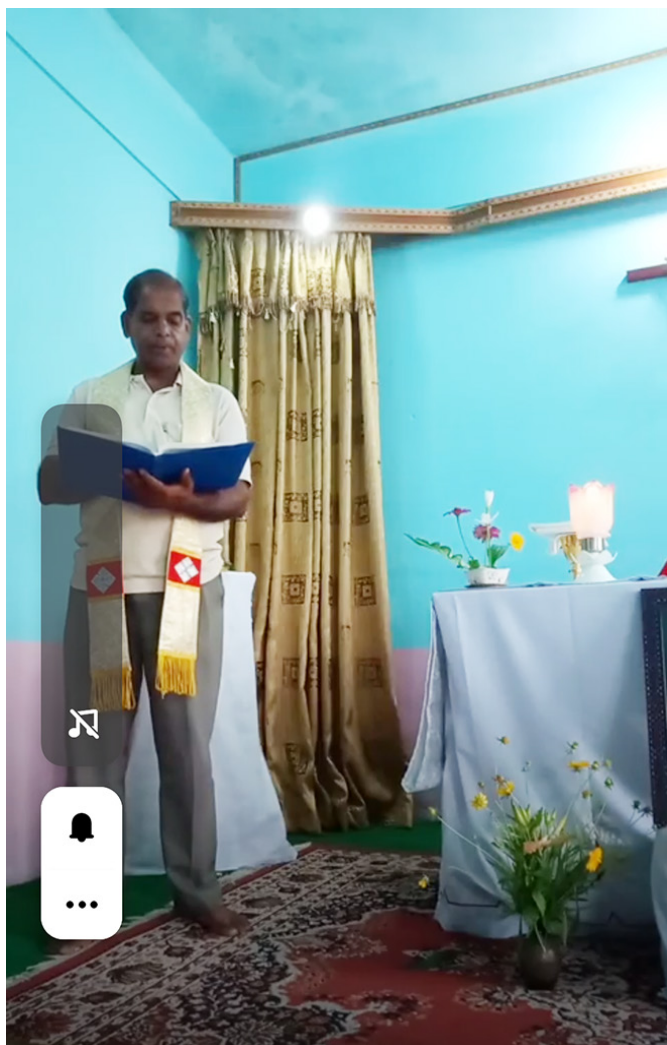

We continue to have online classes for most programs while some are preparing for their board examinations. We wait for the decisions of the government and the University regarding board examinations and admissions to the next academic year. All in the community continue to keep good health. While some of the community members are involved in taking care of the community and its needs others are involved in the Covid 19 Relief program of the College known as WE FEED along with the volunteers taking all the precautions possible. A brief report by the volunteers on our involvement so far is given below.

“We Feed” Program

The COVID-19 virus has been seriously affecting the lives of people globally. The second wave of this virus has had greater impact on people’s lives, especially in Kathmandu. Covid patients have not been able to receive proper healthcare. In order to control the spreading of the virus, Kathmandu valley is under restrictions. Among the various problems the COVID-19 virus has created, the problem to manage daily meal especially for the daily wage workers and those waiting with Covid patients at government hospital caught the attention of the Outreach department of the College. Consequently, we decided to bring some relief to such needy people by providing them with packed food cooked in our canteen. We have been regularly providing packed lunch and dinner along with water to people in need at Teku hospital and Bir hospital. Likewise, the team has been regularly providing with packed food to the people living in the streets of New Road, Temple premises at Bhadrakali and Mahankal.

The food distribution program started from 18 May 2021 with a team of 3 volunteers along with college staff. A total of 3,335 packet of food and 4000 bottles of water have been distributed so far. At present, the team consists of 7 volunteers and has expanded its service by providing 49 families with relief food package consisting of 1 sack rice of 25 kg, 5 kg lentil, 2 ltrs oil, 5 kg beaten rice and 1 kg salt each. Also, the team was able to assist 3 patients with medical support and food at Bir hospital.

Similarly, the team was able to rescue an individual who was struggling to go home. During his stay in the streets of Ratnapark, he was severely beaten by groups of men and was also fighting hard to receive

a day’s meal and a good sleep. The team met him in his worst condition. In close coordination with the Nepal Police, local people at Kalanki bus park, the team was able to book him a seat, give him a good set of clothes, packed meal, some cash for the travel and sent him to Rautahat – his home.

Overall, the program has been running successfully with generous support from the sponsors, teachers, alumni and students. The team has been receiving positive response from the hospital, beneficiaries and other stakeholders. The program has been well appreciated for its careful intervention as the distribution process is conducted following proper COVID-19 guideline. Also, the food has been well acknowledged for its taste and hygiene.

One of our volunteers, Tisha Joshi who has been diligently working from the first day shares her experience so far in her own words as, *“I feel blessed that I have got this opportunity to help people in this pandemic. As we know the COVID-19 pandemic has unveiled different vulnerabilities as well as exposed our weaknesses in preventing a disaster. I would like to sincerely thank St. Xavier’s college for initiating “We Feed” program to help the helpless people. Personally, I believe that this experience will guide me to become a better person for others.”*

Our volunteer Santona Bhattarai, who joined the team later on has been dedicated towards the cause. She shares her experience as, *“This volunteering opportunity has been an enriching as well as motivating experience. Being able to do something for those in need has allowed me to be grateful and cherish my new beginning as a student in this college. Also, this involvement has allowed me to better understand about team coordination, program management and reflect upon importance and value of time. I would like to thank the team and St. Xavier’s college from the bottom of my heart for being hope to those helpless people.”*

Medhavee Upadhyaya, one of the first volunteer has been proactively working to achieve the program goals. She summarizes her involvement in the program as, *“My participation in this program is also my first experience working in such manner – providing me insights of how things work. I feel fortunate and blessed to have been a part of it. Our schedules are hectic but all the tiredness disappear when I witness people’s hope and satisfaction through our program.”*

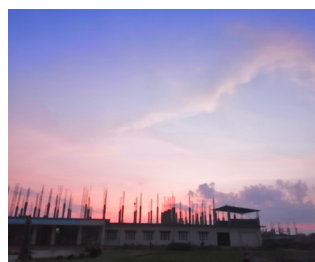
at least five weddings. We have started Sunday Mass Live in Nepali at 6.30 a.m. and Rosary in the evening praying with the intentions of Pope Francis.

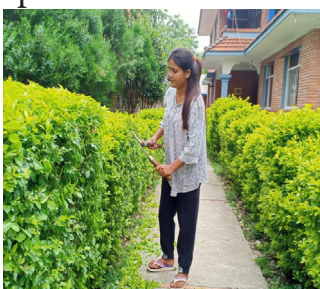

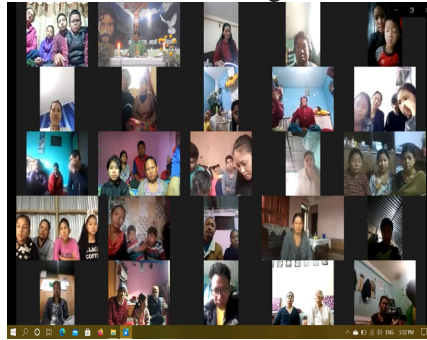

We get to hear that there are quite a good number of COVID 19 cases in Baniyatar, Tokha municipality with hardly any tests. There is a tendency among the people to hide it and stay home without test. Fear prompts them not to let

the concerned authorities to know. A few cases of death have been reported due to COVID 19 in Tokha municipality. Until now two of our parishioners have been found COVID 19 positive. One has recovered and has been tested negative and the other is isolated in her own house. The other family members of the isolated person are doing well and are found with no symptoms.

A man from Tipling (non-Christian) who was an ex-army, residing with family in the airport area in Kathmandu died due to COVID 19. A parishioner who has recovered now and have been tested negative had contacted the virus in his funeral.

A lady parishioner from Goldhunga died in the month of May due to both kidney failures during lockdown. She was cremated without the proper last rite but her ashes were brought and properly placed in the columbarium in the church in the presence of a minimum number of parishioners.

In the month of May, we had another sad news to hear that Sr. Jaya lost her brother-in-law in Bangalore due to covid 19. He left to heavenly abode with grieving wife who is also admitted in the hospital for COVID 19 positive and two of his college going children.

The parish priest of Baniyatar has been helping Nepal Jesuit Society (NJS) to distribute Rahat food materials around Kathmandu district by arranging the Rahat materials for those who are contacting the NJS office for the help.

On May 20, 2021, the Parish in the virtual presence of half of the parishioners inaugurated the celebration of 500th Year of Ignatius' Conversion. In the virtual holy Mass, the parish priest spoke about the need and importance of the 'Ignatian Conversion Year' and highlighted the possible upcoming events throughout the world and specially in Nepal.

On May 29, 2021, the Parish Priest celebrated the virtual live Holy Mass (Shradhanjali Mass which is usually conducted after 13 days of death) for one of the deceased persons in Delhi, India. The Holy Mass was attended virtually by a Ranchi Jesuit, Fr Mahender Tigga and about 100 people with beautifully singing hymns, a full stretched holy Mass. After the Holy Mass, paying of homage by the family members and sharing about the deceased person by 10 people were done. The event was stretched by 5 continuous re-logins for continuation on zoom adding up to 200 minutes online in total.

Some ways to beat boredom during lockdown

DESIDERI HOUSE, BOUDHA

After being locked down in America for 12 months longer than planned, it was wonderful to get back to Nepal in mid-April. The Jesuits at Campion Center, my province's "vriddhashram" and health center, could not have been more welcoming or hospitable. Nonetheless it was good to get home to Kathmandu. I left the US just at the point when Covid variants were said to be spreading rapidly in the northeast. Because it was not clear whether a vaccinated person could be infected by the mutant viruses, or be a carrier, I decided to stay in quarantine for the standard two weeks. I had only a few days of relative freedom before the Kathmandu Valley lockdown began. I would barely need the fingers of both hands to count the number of friends I've been able to see since returning.

The KU Centre for Buddhist Studies has been teaching solely online since March of last year. It was recently decided that this arrangement will stay in place at least until this time next year. Given the unexpectedly severe Covid surge the country is suffering from now, it was probably a wise decision. Shortly before returning to Boudha I was asked by KU-CBS to take charge of their PhD program.

Though we have had permission to offer the doctorate for nearly two decades, the program had only attracted a small number of candidates, of whom two are now completing their degrees. This spring a surprising number of people expressed interest in applying. Three or four are likely to be admitted. One of the applicants was a research associate who worked with me a few years back. I will supervise her research as she continues her study of Newar ritual dance.

Fr. Yann Vagneux, the French MEP father who normally lives in Varanasi, has been here in Boudha since November. He came back to Nepal as soon as the government allowed tourists to return, and he hoped that India would begin to issue visitor visas soon thereafter. Like most of us, his plans were disrupted by the continuing pandemic. After six months at Desideri House, Fr Yann now has his own place in Boudha, but will visit a few times a week. He was able to obtain a student visa for Nepal and will continue his study of Sanskrit while waiting for India to open its borders.

HRDRC, SANAPA

The month of May passed by staying inside the house and its compound. The community members often found working in the kitchen garden. They also regularly cleared up shrubs, grass in the compound. The Nepal Jesuit Society (NJS) office has created Pandemic Help Desk and flashed it on Facebook, WhatsApp and its website. As a result, from the same day of posting it, calls started coming. Mr. Bimal and Fr. Juel patiently receive the calls. They then arrange food kits with a local shop and dispatch the food kits to them. So far, NJS has distributed dry ration kits to the areas of Balkhu, Sanepa, Bhainsipati, Jawalakhel, Kumaripati, Satdobato, Pulchok, Purano Baneshwar in Kathmandu valley. The help desk also received calls from Kohalpur in West Nepal and Jhapa in East Nepal. Through our networks in Kohalpur and Jhapa NJS distributed food kits to the needy. In some occasions, Fr. Amrit

went out with Mr. Bimal to survey and inspect the slums and street corners to see if our food distribution is done fairly. According to their observation, there are many restaurant workers, street vendors, rag pickers and daily wage workers who need food kits as they have no job during this lockdown. NJS is trying to help them in its small way. With new NJS IDs for mobile clinics in the Valley, the Mobile clinic staff too is out there distributing medicine and looking after healthcare of nearby villages around Kathmandu. During the extension of lockdown our staff come to office as and when they find easy alleys to reach here.

Fr. Amrit made his annual retreat during first week of lockdown. Frs. Amrit, Mathew and Thomas have already received second doses of covid vaccine. Fr. Juel is waiting for his first dose.
