As the month of October dedicated to 'Our Lady of Rosary', St. Ignatius Parish, Baniyatar had organized online Rosary for parishioners. The families who joined the online Rosary took turn to conduct it each day. Looking at sharp rise in COVID-19 virus spread in Kathmandu valley, the parish has taken enough precautions to prevent its spread among the people who visit the parish for various needs. Schedule for the Holy Mass is still not fixed due to guidelines imposed on public gatherings. But it is made available to anyone who requests for it any-

time of the day throughout a week. Thus, there are few regular individuals and small groups who have been keeping the parish priest busy other than the regular Masses to Bambino Sisters separately.

Last two months, there were sudden decline in request for the ration provided by the church. When it was enquired, the parish priest discovered that the parishioners and the neighbours who had approached him earlier were feeling shy to request him again. They had received it more than three to five times. Therefore, the parish priest came up with

an ingenuity - 'double wage ration for work'. The idea not only helped the needy but also completed unfinished works done in parish premise. Thus, the parish priest through the help of the zone leaders, paid their wages for work in the form of rations doubled of their normal wages. The church, now has a complete 'Way of the Cross' pathway alongside its property. The church has helped around 350 families by providing rations until now.

The Assumption Church, Dhobighat has organized an online/offline 'Singing Competition' for anyone in the Vicariate based on the composition of Fr. Richard's songs. After going through rigorous practice and song recording for presentation for more than a month, Miss Sunita K.C. has reached the final, the third stage in the ongoing competition. We are eagerly waiting for the grand finale and wish her all the very best. The Vicariate of Nepal is also conducting a 'Drawing and Painting Competition' for the 'Holy Childhood' between 5-8 and 9-14 years of age groups. The first parish level of competition at Baniyatar was organized on October 15, 2020. The three finalists from each group will now compete online in Deanery level which is the second level of competition.

The parish is also availing internet facility for the online classes for under privileged students of the parish and neighbourhood. Thanks to Fr. George P.M., S.J., Principal, St. Xavier's School, Jawalakhel who made it possible keeping in mind the poor students of the church and neighbourhood.

Fr. Amrit Rai, S.J., Regional Superior made his annual visitation to the parish on October 7, 2020 where he said Holy Mass for few invited leaders of various groups. After the Mass he met all of them and had a small meeting. Thank! you so much Fr. Amrit, it was a great moment of grace for us. We had a chance to interact with you and express our feelings, ideas and concerns.

Until September, the parish had good news or at least all parishioners were keeping safe and healthy. In mid-October one of the families of our parish, Ms. Kumari Gurung, contracted Corona virus. With Ms. Kumari, her entire family except her son were tested positive of COVID-19. The whole family is under home quarantine; but all are doing well. The youngest daughter is 8 years' old. She is a 3rd standard student at St. Xavier's School, Jawalakhel.
