




General Curia

Father General reconvened his “Extended Council” from 9 to 13 September in Rome. This time, four themes were on the agenda. First, the engagement among Superiors and Directors of Works with respect to shared mission. The second was the question of networking to ensure a stronger and more effective presence of the Society in the world.

The third theme reflected on the Ignatian Year that will be celebrated from May 2021 to July 2022. This will commemorate the 500th anniversary of the conversion of Saint Ignatius after being wounded in Pamplona.

Lastly, a full day of the work of the *Consiglio Allargato* was dedicated to Amazonia, as the special Synod convened by Pope Francis on the Pan-Amazon region will soon commence. It was pointed out that REPAM (Pan-Amazon Church Network) is an important instrument, broader than the Society of Jesus, to coordinate the involvement of the Church, and make heard the voice of the poor and the forgotten in the Amazon region.

WHAT DO YOU SEE ?

A retreat for the staff of Jesuit institutions was organized by Jesuit School Board at Vinayalaya, from 16 – 18 August. Guided by Fr. Charles Rodrigues we were asked to spend time reflecting on the Bible passages given to us. This time of silent reflection was indeed very important for us teachers, to rethink our vocation and our duty towards the young minds entrusted to us. It helped us assess our own thoughts, feelings and our roles in the institution. Group discussions and sharing by the various schools helped us get a better understanding of the perspective of the other school teachers.



The main theme of the retreat was the question 'What do you see?' A question which made us reflect on the present scenario in our locality, city, country and the world at large.

In keeping with the theme we were introduced to the Universal Apostolic Preferences (UAP) which will be the focus in all the Jesuit institutions. They are

- Caring for our common home
- Promoting the spiritual exercises
- Journeying with the Youth
- Walking with the Poor

Fr Gerard Rodrigues enlightened us on important environmental issues and urged us to care for creation. He spoke on our greed and craving for more "Do I really need this" was the essential question we were asked to reflect on. Being a Science teacher I was intrigued by the concept of Environmental Footprint. We were told that the making of a single T shirt consumed nearly 2700 liters of water.

The sessions by Br Tommy gave us an insight into his work in Afghanistan with the Hazara tribe. Through 'Spiritual conversations', Fr. John Cyriac focused on our role in implementing the UAP. He urged us to practice 'Intentional speaking and attentive listening'. He also conducted a session on 'Journeying with the youth'. As teachers we were called to challenge the youth to develop critical thinking skills which would be done through the Ignatian Pedagogical Paradigm (IPP) method in our daily teaching.

We left Vinayalaya feeling restless, with a lot of questions answered and a few unanswered, rethinking our role as Jesuit educators, but with a ray of hope, fortified with the Ignatian spirit to make a difference in the lives of our students. We are grateful to Fr. Francis Swamy for organizing this retreat.

Jesuits and Agriculture

Joel Noronha has been making waves in the agro-marketing field. Two projects presented by him and a team of fellow students won national level awards.

1. First prize at the National level Business Plan Competition among the Indian B-Schools, held at MANAGE (National Institute of Agricultural Extension Management, Hyderabad - An Organization of Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare, Govt of India) on 16th August.

The Business Plan was prepared on *Mahua Nutribar*, first of its kind of product in the market, as an 'on-the-go' 'Meal Replacer' for a target segment of busy-working professionals in Tier 1 and Tier 2 cities.



2. First prize at the National level Social Idea Competition among the Indian B-Schools, held at IRMA (Institute of Rural Management Anand) on 7th September. The idea was based on NTFP-based (Non Timber Forest Products) business model for livelihood creation and income generation for tribals throughout the year. The Model was named TESEED - the Tribal Entrepreneurial Socio-Economic and Environmental Development. It was based on a two-pronged strategy - sustainable sourcing and procurement practice by the tribals on the one hand and identification of a product gap and market potential that can be catered to by the NTFP in urban markets on the other.
