Fr General has appointed **Fr Dominic Quyen Vu SJ** as the next Provincial of the Australian Province. Fr Quyen entered the Society of Jesus in 1994, was ordained in 2004 and took his Final Vows in 2014.

Fr General has appointed Fr. Soosai Mani (52) as the new Provincial of the Delhi Province. He joined the Jesuits in 1987 and was ordained to the priesthood in 2002. Fr. Soosai brings to his new mission wide ranging experiences as Parish priest, Director of candidates, Manager of various institutions and Superior of communities.

Fr General has appointed **Fr. Jan Roser (51)** as new Provincial of the German Province. Jan Roser was Socius to Provincial Johannes Siebner, who died on 16 July from illness. He will remain in office until the creation of the new Province of Central Europe (ECE), planned for April 2021. Fr. Roser joined the Society in 1996 and was ordained in 2003.

#### **COURSE ON PUBLIC INTEREST LAW FOR CITIZENS**

A Course on Public Interest Law for Citizens conducted by **Goa Foundation** in partnership with **Swades** was inaugurated on February 17, 2020 at the Jesuit House in Panaii. Justice R.K. Batta, Former Judge, Bombay High Court in Goa delivered the keynote address. The course was designed for ordinary citizens to understand the structures, systems, procedures, laws and key judgments that pertain to obtaining justice through the administrative and judicial systems in India, and Goa in particular. It took the form of 18 lectures followed by Q & A, conducted over the period from 17 February to 21 August, 2020. Due to the outbreak of covid-19, the course was temporarily put on hold. When it was resumed on 16 July, the remaining sessions were held 'virtually', through the video conferencing application, Zoom.

Each lecture was recorded, and participants were given access to the recorded lecture for future reference, and also to assist those who could not attend certain individual sessions. The videos are being uploaded onto a dedicated YouTube channel, so that they can be freely accessed by the wider public. Additionally, some reading materials were provided to participants. These usually took the form of slides that were used in respective lectures. At the end of the course, participants received certificates.

The faculty comprised experienced individuals drawn from a variety of professional capacities – including lawyers, ex-judges, social activists, and other experts. The topics were covered by different speakers.

The feedback on the course has been overwhelmingly positive, with participants, volunteers and speakers all expressing that the experience has been very worthwhile, and one which has resulted in a considerable enhancement of knowledge in various fields. The topics that received the most positive feedback included: Environmental Laws, RTI, Administrative Justice, Drafting and Arguing PIL petitions, Drafting Demandfor Justice Letters, Lokayukta, and the PIL Practical Exercises.

## LOYOLA, MARGAO

Deacon Raul joined the community on 04th Sept after serving his term of imprisonment (quarantine) of 14 days at Old Goa under the shadow of big brother St. Francis Xavier. The community at Old Goa did not grant him bail but treated him well and made sure he got his daily quota of Indian and Goan recipes after 3 years of pasta. Now he is getting used to having H<sub>2</sub>O and not wine at table. Raul left for Khanapur (place of his diaconate ministry) and Londa (his home town) to make arrangements for his ordination that is scheduled for 17<sup>th</sup> October. After a very short honeymoon he will be back at Loyola, Margao to begin his teaching apostolate engaging in online classes. Presently, he is doing his retreat in preparation for his ordination and we join him in praying that the Lord showers on him the graces he will need once he enters the vineyard.

Goa, is an ecologically sensitive state; to its east lies the Western Ghats and to its west the Arabian Sea. The question: "What do the waters hold?" was timely as pictures in the newspapers showed large amounts of plastic being dragged out of the sea in the nets of our traditional *ramponkars*. This shocking photo made us realize the need to conscientize our students about the rich beauty of the coastal ecosystem. Dr. Soraya Menezes organized two webinars for the boys and teachers. One was in collaboration with an NGO, Coastal Impact based in Aldona, on the bounties of the blue world, and Marine Awareness for the students of Stds. VII-X. The session highlighted the diverse life forms in our marine ecosystems



and at the same time made the students reflect on

how our habits and insensitivity is endangering this precious resource. The students gained insight on the habitat, basic anatomical features and adaptations of jelly fish, sharks like rays, whales, corals, seahorses, anemone fish (clown fish), etc. The impact of human activity, overfishing, pollution due to plastic resulting in micro plastic accumulation, rise in sea level and bleaching of corals due to global warming, increase in pollutants like oil and other debris in the oceans was highlighted. This was followed by a O&A session wherein a diverse range of questions surfaced and was ably answered by the organizers. The response was amazing with Google Meet reaching its maximum capacity of 100 participants while many more who wished to join were left disappointed and pleaded for a repeat session.

The second webinar was organized in collaboration with Blue Resources, a Sri Lanka based NGO. The participants were given an idea into the world of Mantarays and Sharks. Learning from previous experience and to accommodate the large number of students who show interest in attending these webinars, we hosted it on two Google Meet links. The two webinars were well appreciated and a number of parents also joined in together with their wards.

After having adjusted to the live virtual classes fairly well, it was time to take various school competitions online too. A virtual inter-class group singing competition was held for the boys of Standards 7<sup>th</sup> to 9<sup>th</sup>. Under the guidance of Mr. Roque D'Costa, the boys put up some splendid performances. The best performances can we viewed on the Loyola High School, Margao, Youtube channel.

On 22<sup>nd</sup> Sept, LESA (Loyola Ex-students Association) in collaboration with Rotary Club of Margao Midtown, undertook a Blood Donation Camp at Clube Harmonia. It was heartening to see 42 donors braving the unpleasant weather and Covid apprehensions to come forward to donate blood. Two young, able-bodied Jesuits, **Jimmy** (Loyola) and **Orville** (PAI, Raia), lined up to offer blood. Some of the LESA members were present to coordinate the exercise. As a sign of encouragement it is edifying to note that Mr. Ubaldino Dias, an ex-student, donated blood for



the 181<sup>st</sup> time. Surely a great gesture to humanity and needs to be commended. A number of Ex-student Associations around the country commended


this exercise undertaken by LESA on the JAAI whatsapp group.

## **MONTI FEST AND JESUITS**

The name 'Monti Fest' for 'The Nativity of Mary'

originated in present Old Goa. After conquering Tiswadi, Goa, Afonso Albuquerque ordered in 1510 to build a chapel in honour of Our Lady. It was built c. 1515 on a hillock and named, 'The Chapel of Our Lady of Mount'. In Portuguese, 'Monte' means mountain. Thus, the name Monti Saibinn (Our Lady of Mount) came



at the age of nineteen. After this, he enrolled himself as a soldier in the army of King Charles V. He entered the Society of Jesus in 1546 at Coimbra, Portugal.

He was a good preacher and very intelligent. Francis Xavier appointed him the Rector of St. Paul College, Goa and the Vice-Provincial of the East Province of the Society of Jesus in April 1552. He introduced teaching of music in St. Paul College. He made liturgy lively and asked the newly converted children to bring flowers and to sprinkle them around the statue of Mother Mary, during the novenas preceding 8<sup>th</sup>September. The reference to this custom is found in his letters written to the General of the Society of Jesus published in Documenta Indica. This custom of sprinkling flowers was borrowed from the local celebrations of Ganesh Chaturthi and adapted for the newly introduced Catholic religion. Though now celebrated in Goa, this feast was an ordinary

one for them. Outside Goa, especially in Karnataka and Sindhudurg district of Maharashtra, for the Konknni Catholics, this is the major feast combined with blessing of new corn and having family lunch using banana leaves with vegetarian meals of various dishes. Fr. Gaspar Barzeus and the other

Jesuits, who followed him to work in Tiswadi and Salcete, are responsible for spreading this fine custom of sprinkling or offering flowers to Mother Mary during the Novena days of Monti Fest. Fr. Gaspar died in Goa on 18<sup>th</sup> October 1553.

# Fr Jacob Carvalho, SJ 1944-2020

**Fr Jacob's** favourite saying was: "Let you greatest happiness always be to make others happy." This eminent Jesuit priest and former principal of St Paul's High School, Belagavi, died on 12<sup>th</sup> September 2020 after a brief illness. He was 75 years of age and 57 years in the Society of Jesus. Those who knew him - his former students and those with whom he worked, paid rich tributes to their 'Great Guruji,' including those working or settled outside Belagavi. Anyone who knew Jacob would describe him as a quiet, soft-spoken person who was very concerned about everyone: community members, teachers, domestic staff, relatives and friends. He was administering at the newly set up St Paul's Pre-university College in his own quiet and adequate ways when he was called home to God.



Born on 16 December, 1944, in Kakkeri, Belagavi, Karnataka, Jacob entered the novitiate in the year 1963 at Vinayalaya, Mumbai, and was ordained a priest on

30<sup>th</sup>April 1977 at Fatima Cathedral, Belagavi. He pronounced his final vows on 15<sup>th</sup>August 1986 at Loyola, Pune. He was honest, hard-working, and ever ready to shoulder any responsibility. He was an excellent student throughout and would gently encourage those under his care to do well too.

Jacob spent most of his priestly years in the field of education: He was Vice-Principal and Hostel Director in Nesargi from 1977-81; Principal of Rosary English High School, Ajra, during the years 1981-83, 1986-91, 2006-09, and 2012-12. He moved to Pune in 1984 where he was Vice-Principal and Parish Priest at Loyola for two years. Again, he was Vice-Principal and Parish Priest at St. Xavier's, Kolhapur, from 1991-92. He took over the reins of St. Paul's, Belagavi, in 1992 and led the school as Principal for 12 years. In 2013, he was sent to Gadhinglaj to assist in the parish. There was a need for a Principal and Manager to run the new St. Paul's School begun in Khanapur. Jacob responded positively to that call in 2014, and saw to it - with his gentlemanly ways - that parents wanted their wards to be placed in the new Jesuit school. He worked there for five years until the provincial asked him to take up the leadership of St. Paul's PUC, Belagavi. After praying over this new invitation, Jacob responded: "I will go wherever the need is greatest and where I can be of service."

Jacob possessed a unique ability to lovingly bridge the gap between the poor and rich students. He was loved by all. He was never on a pedestal and was always on the people's level; people felt comfortable in his presence. He was a generous man, loving and gentle in his pastoral relationships.

People loved Jacob; he was a priest who was simple, gentle and silent and had his own ways of doing things effectively. He was ever ready to shoulder any responsibility and excelled in whatever was assigned to him. He was a dignified and gracious Jesuit, endowed with many positive and spiritual qualities. He was much appreciated for his patience and readiness to listen to each and every one.

One of the teachers who worked with Jacob described him as: "a great inspirer of thousands of students. He was well respected for his austere sense of simplicity, empathy, compassion, humility, and divinity. His exemplary and distinguished stewardship was an enlightening inspiration to everyone. Everyone used to experience bliss after meeting him." Fr Jacob has left a rich legacy for his followers.
