St. Xavier's University, Kolkata and its various departments organised 15 Webinars in total in the last four months. St. Xavier's University, Kolkata has officially registered its Alumni Association. The Faculty members have agreed to forego 10% of their monthly salary in collaboration with the University from August to December 2020.

Online classes for Final Semester students are over. The Final exams are awaited. Online classes for Intermediate Semesters are going on. Admissions to the First Year Courses will be completed by August 31 and the online classes will commence on September 10, 2020.



Gaston Roberge: An Appreciation

Fr Gaston Roberge SJ, founder of Chitrabani Institute, Kolkata, and film and media scholar par excellence, passed away at St Xavier's College, Kolkata, on August 27, 2020. He was 85.



Both Chitrabani started by Gaston Roberge, and the Xavier Institute of Communications, founded by Francis "Packy" MacFarland, were born within a year of each other, a little over 50 years ago in 1969-70, in two different parts of the country, Calcutta (now Kolkata) and Bombay (now Mumbai).

The Xavier Institute – or XIC, as it came to be known defined itself as a training institute for the professional media from the very first. Bombay was the media capital of the country, and it seemed the right place to start a college for professional media training. That's why XIC was located on the campus of St Xavier's College, Bombay. Though its courses varied in name, scope and duration over the years, it has always adhered to its academic blueprint: professional skills within the context of a humanist ethos – the universal Jesuit hallmark.

Chitrabani's design was different. Its emphasis was film (as its very name implied) and it soon established itself as a place for film lovers and serious students of cinema. Roberge encouraged many young talents to explore the visual media through photography, film and video. Among the many friendships which developed as a result, Roberge counted Satyajit Ray, Mrinal Sen, Mani Kaul and Kobita Sarkar.

One of his protégés, George Ponodath, a Jesuit like himself, took charge of the Educational Media Research Centre at Kolkata's St Xavier's , and made it into arguably the best production unit of educational films in the country.

If XIC's contribution was linear, systematic and academic, Chitrabani was more intuitive, asymmetrical, and highly personalized in the genius of Father Roberge.

For several years, Roberge also headed an adult education program in Bengali through radio. Called Chetana, it broadcast its messages of literacy, child-care and women's empowerment all over Bengal and Bangladesh.

Roberge's major contribution however has been in film scholarship, and together with it, a critical understanding of the 'new media'.

His first book, titled Chitrabani (1975), (like the institution



he started) is a basic handbook for film enthusiasts, helping one to understand the grammar and the idiom of film, with perceptive insights into the history of Indian cinema.

Another, Mediation (1978) is a collection of articles, anecdotes, photos, cartoons, questions and quotations on the action of the media in society. Roberge always believed – much like McLuhan before him -- that the technology of the electronic media were slowly but surely changing society, and with it human nature as we've known it. In the 1980s, when XIC started its program "Mediaworld", to inculcate critical reflection on the media in high schools, he warmly encouraged it. Mediaworld was a venture ahead of its time, and sadly, short-lived.

In essence, Roberge the film scholar, explored the various facets of today's media culture with imagination and variety. The books followed, one after the other. The Faithful Witness (2000) explored the nature of Christian communication; Cyberbani (2005), is "being human in the new media environment"; and Media Dancer (2008) took the analysis further with the internet and social media. Roberge has written almost thirty books on topics related to cinema and the media.

One of his last books returns to his favourite topic, popular film: Indian Film Theory (2011). "I had been asking myself since the 1980s why we do not have a new theory of popular film," said Roberge. "It was only recently that I got an answer after studying a 2000-year old Indian treatise of drama and dance, Natya Sastra – The Science of Drama." The result is a new perspective on the theories underlying Indian commercial cinema. It is widely acknowledged that this Jesuit priest has made a "significant contribution" to film with his new book on Indian film theory.

All through that marvelous decade of the 80s and the early 90s, when we passed from Doordarshan/ Akashvani to color TV, video, FM radio and cell phones, Roberge was a frequent visitor to XIC.

Those were still the early years of mass communication in India, and the Jesuit fraternity through its umbrella group, JESCOM, would meet frequently to discuss and argue, to share project planning and squabble over funding, to build friendships, solidarity and encourage innovation. Gaston Roberge was always there at these meetings, looked up to with respect, admiration and certain affection.

It is a sign of how much the last decades have changed us that no one speaks of the 'mass media', or 'mass communications' anymore. Today the buzz words are 'online', 'social media' -- facebook, twitter, instagram, the internet -- and the little gizmo you hold in your hand connecting you with everyone, everywhere, all at once: duniya mutthi mein.

Roberge was a Jesuit in Calcutta, one of a rare breed of scholars -- men like Lafont, Goethals, Johanns, Antoine, Beckers, Verstraeten and so very many others, who left their imprint not just on a city, but on a whole epoch.

To this distinguished group, we may now add the name of Gaston Roberge. For wherever Indian cinema is studied, wherever the new media culture is analyzed, we will never forget that it was his name and his writings which first opened the door.


Obituary of Fr. Gaston Roberge (Read Out at Funeral Mass at D.A. on 28.08.2020)

Dear friends, today you have not come here to mourn the death of Fr. Gaston Roberge; you have come here to celebrate his life; a life lived to the full; a life lived in and through media, for the people. Finally it was a life lived for God. So let us not mourn him but celebrate this great man's life. The love and respect that we have for him is greater than what death can claim and his memory will live with us for a long time to come. For a person who has lived a life of faith and commitment, death is not the end of life; it is a step into the life of God. Gaston has gone home to Jesus; let us celebrate it; that is the Jesuit tradition. Though lying motionless there, let me speak to Gaston as I have done so many times, for so many years.

Dear Gaston

Though we had lived together and worked together for so many years, I cannot be near you at your death. But I am sure you can communicate now better with me from heaven, without the encumbrance of any medium or language. You have always been a good listener and now for the last time, may I request you to listen to me again? I ask this because for me you are not really dead and gone; you will remain with me for a long time to come, probably till the end of my own life. That is the depth to which you have touched me and formed me.

Dear Gaston, you have left for us a legacy that will speak



with vitality, long after your mortal remains perish. It is a legacy of professionalism, of commitment, of intellectual integrity and originality. It is a legacy of dedication to God through excellent professional work, whatever that may be. Yes, Gaston you taught me what it means to be dedicated to one's work, especially when one is misunderstood and not appreciated. You taught me what it takes to be a professional film-maker. Do you remember what you told me when I had spent 23 hours of non-stop editing of a programme and told you that I was exhausted? I remember: you told me, "That's the price you pay for being in media; that's the cost of professionalism; do it and finish the programme". That was done in your own gentle way, and yet unambiguously. That was a challenge you gave not only to me but you practiced it as well.

You had imbibed the Ignatian idea of Magis fully and implemented it in all your works. You always wanted the best in everything. When you wanted to make a film, you employed the best cameraman in town, Subrato Mitra. When you wanted to make an animation film on the children of Pilkhana, you employed one of the best creative minds in town, Brian Balen and sent him all the way to California to learn the technology



so that the outcome would be not just good but of world standard. When you wanted good sound recording system, you brought the best equipment of that time in the world: Nagra. These are just three examples to show how relentlessly you struggled to attain perfection in all that you did. That was characteristic of you, Gaston. But you wanted perfection not in your work alone; it was just symbolic: in stretching your hand to perfection you were actually seeking the face of God!

There was a time when Gaston Roberge was a catchword that exemplified authority in the world of film and television. Television interviews, radio talks, newspaper articles, talks, lectures were all part of your daily chores. You did it gladly and each time you spoke or wrote something, there was substance and freshness in it. That is why people came to you and you were invited to various parts of the country and the world—to speak, to lecture and to teach. You were associated with a number of prestigious institutions, such as Film and Television Institute of India, Pune, Satyajit Ray Film and Television Institute, Kolkata, National Institute of Design, Ahmedabad, Jamia Milia Islamia University, New Delhi, Calcutta University, Jadavpur University, Roopkala Kendro, Kolkata and others. You had a lot to do with the Bengali section of Radio Veritas Asia.




In many matters you were far ahead of your time, Gaston. That is why many, including myself, failed to understand you fully. You dared to dream the impossible and you had the tenacity to bring that dream to reality. Chitrabani and EMMRC are your dreams concretized. But that is not all. A mind like yours cannot be contained in two buildings. Your numerous books, beginning with Chitrabani, then Mediation, The faithful Witness, Communication, Cinema, Development - from Morosity to Hope, Satyajit Ray are landmarks in the world of print media. You became aware of the onset of cyber communication and immediately your ever curious mind searched for the implications of this newcomer. You came out with Cyberbani, a thought provoking, insightful look into the implications of this new medium. Your final contribution Media Dancer – who sets the tune? is both thought-provoking and a warning to the emergence of media hegemony. You were ahead of many even in this new field even at that advanced age.

Born in Montreal, Canada in 1935, Gaston joined the Jesuit order as a young man of 21. After his initial religious studies and philosophy he came to Kolkata on 15 October 1961. Though extensively travelled, he made Kolkata his home. Among his close friends were Satyajit Ray and Mrinal Sen; he studied their films and became an authority on them. Gaston saw and was inspired by the film Pather Panchali, already



when he was in Canada. No wonder, when he came to Kolkata he sought out and became a close friend of Satyajit Ray. But Gaston did not get stuck there; his mind was open. The Russian film maker Sergei Eisenstein was another person that he Gaston mastered and wrote a book on his films. Battleship Potemkin and October were Gaston's favourite Russian Films.



One of his Canadian friends was the legendary Cardinal Leger who helped Gaston realize many of his dreams.

When a person has lived a full life, doing what he did for the greater glory of God, he can say with St. Paul, "for me to die is gain". But God never sees his children die; he simply sees them coming home. Now Gaston, Farewell. Go Gaston, go to where the Father is, go to your real home that is everlasting and when you reach there, remember us.
