PROVINCIAL'S MUSINGS



On 25 August 2020, Fr General appointed Fr Dionysius Gerard Leonard Vaz, the Provincial of Karnataka Province. So, habemus Provincialem.

Born on 27 August 1963, Fr Dion acquired two masters degrees, in Sociology and Pastoral counselling. He joined the Society on June 20, 1981 and made his solemn profession on June 06, 2004. The Society gave him different missions as the director of the pre-novitiate and vocation promoter, parish priest, province consultor, novice director, superior of Bijapur Mission, rector of St Aloysius College, Mangaluru, all of which he served with great devotion and dedication.

The brief profile of Dion indicates that he is a man of exposure, experience and expertise. The varied ministries have helped him to hone his varied skills of administration and accompaniment; of training programmes and practical knowledge on finances; of constructions and legal issues. The wide exposure has not only enriched him, but has also helped him to know the Province, its men, and its works, and also to relate to the Local Church, CRI and the government officials.

Dion has a rich personality with emotional and intellectual depth, daring and decisive nature, and above all, a gift of discernment and love for the poor. The participation in the GC 36, the REGAE process and the formulation of the Karnataka Province Apostolic Plan (KPAP) have further enriched and equipped him to be an effective leader.

Of course, there are issues: the unprecedented times caused by the pandemic COVID 19 and the hostile political situation fostered by the right wing ideologies on the one hand, the New Educational Policy (NEP) and the collapse of the economy on the other, will surely pose him enough challenges. However, he is going to be the Provincial of a Province, which is blessed by the Lord in many ways. There are 307 competent, committed and credible men, and more than 80 apostolic units. The life in the spirit in the Province is sufficiently deep, community life cordial and cohesive, apostolic ministry robust, and moreover, we have a fairly good and well worked out apostolic plan to serve the Lord and His Church in Karnataka.

I am grateful to the Province for praying for, supporting and helping me to be a channel of graces to the Province. I am sure the Province will support Dion, and that God will continue to be propitious to him so that the Province experiences many and abundant graces in and through Dion!

Fr Walter Andrade, SJ
(05 July 1943 – 26 August 2020)

We are here to bid earthly farewell to our dear brother Fr Walter Andrade SJ. We remember him as a warm, dedicated, friendly, affectionate, intellectual and scholarly person, and yet a simple human person in touch with everyone and everything. It is not easy to say goodbye to him, a good and wonderful companion. He was an effective priest, great teacher and principal, an educationist, and a good Jesuit. For all of us, this death of his is an unexpected shock and looks as if it came too quickly and too suddenly.

Once a medical doctor, Emil J. Freireich made a statement: "In my opinion death is an insult, the stupidest and ugliest thing that can happen to a human being". It is a startling statement to us as Christians and as priests. I would deny it outright. Yet, it helps us all to reflect on a problem: what does it mean for a human person to die and what is death? Death is not a mere flight from a machine-like body that remains human body after death. It is not merely a biological event. It is a loss of something unique - when a human person dies an 'I' lost to the world and a 'You' is lost to the survivors.

This is where lies the life's tragedy and death's insult, where a unique 'I' and irreplaceable 'you' is destroyed. The 'I' which visualised the beauty, saw the stars, enjoyed music, celebrated Eucharist, in a gentle way touched the hearts of friends, gave consolation to the relatives, is lost to the world and to the survivors. This 'I' God will not replace and cannot replace because this I is someone's special, personal, loving and shining which will never die. That is what our dear friend, a Jesuit and a priest Fr Walter Andrade has been. He is and has been a special, unique person to us and now he has gone forever to enjoy his eternal reward. For us Fr Walty will always remain a memory.

Perhaps Fr Walty from heaven is looking down at us in his usual cheerful way to tell us: 'Why are you sad on my account? Rejoice and be happy. Share my joy with each other. I have completed happily my earthly journey. Come and rejoice with me.' There is a little verse which says:

Do not stand at my grave and weep,
I am not there, I do not sleep,
I am a thousand winds that blow,
I am I diamond glint on the snow,
I am sunlight on ripened grain,
I am the light autumn rain.
When you awake in the morning hush,
I am the swift uplifting the rush,
Of birds circling in flight,
I am the stars that shine at the night.
Do not stand at my grave and weep.
I am not there; I do not sleep



That is what our loving Walty has been - always happy and cheerful.

Fr Walter Stephen Andrade was the youngest child of Stephen Andrade and Mary Andrade born on the fifth of July 1943 at Cascia, Mangalore. He did his primary schooling at St John's school Bolar and the rest of the schooling, PUC and graduation, at St Aloysius College, Mangalore. Later he went to Loyola College, Chennai for his Masters in Economics. He taught for a year at Loyola College, when he experienced the divine call to join the Society of Jesus at Mount St Joseph, Bangalore in 1967. After the novitiate he taught for a year at St Joseph's College and went to de Nobili College, Pune for his philosophy studies in 1970. He taught for two years at St Joseph's College and then did his theology studies at Vidya Jyothi Delhi. He was ordained a priest on April 30, 1977. He was appointed vice principal at St Joseph's Commerce College in 1978-79. Then he was the socius to the provincial for two years. This was followed by his office as principal at St Joseph's College of Commerce and St

Joseph's Evening College and St Aloysius Evening College, Mangalore for nearly 20 years. He was also in charge of junior scholastics at Asha Kiran and student scholastics at Dharwar. He took over as the superior of Fatima Retreat House for a year in 2007. He worked at St Aloysius College as the finance officer for about eight years till he was directed to take rest at Mount St Joseph and finally at Fatima Retreat House where he reached his culmination. This in short is the life story of Fr Water Andrade.

Fr Walter was very close to his family. Betty Andrade/ Lasrado was his eldest and only sister, who was very close to him. He had five brothers: Edwin, Gerry, Alfred, Stany who have gone for their heavenly reward. Rudolph is his only surviving brother, who lives in Bangalore with his wife Cynthia. Allan, son of Rudolph and Cynthia, currently a lawyer in California, USA, extends a brief message from his family. All of them recollect the warmth, familiarity, involvement and encouragement of Fr Walter towards each of them. It is because of him most have reached high positions in life. Every member of the family has to say volumes about him.

Fr Walter was known for his hard and dedicated work. His main interest was his teaching administration and accounts. In most places where he worked, he organised the staff salary and introduced proper salary scales. He had great love for the poor. Whenever possible, he helped the non-teaching staff because he knew their salaries were low. He was the one for giving financial support to students in the colleges and was used to give fee concession without anyone's knowledge. He welcomed students from economically backward situations and provided further help. He had no hesitation in asking well-to-do parents to support the fees of poor students in the college and whatever help he received he directed it to the scholarship fund.

Fr Walter was a great educator and he lived that call. As a principal he was a good administrator and a good teacher. He never missed his lectures in economics and his notes were circulated in the college by the students. All loved him and flocked his office all the time. They would share their problems with him and he was a good counsellor to them. He was very close to the staff members, both teaching and non-teaching, in places where he worked. Several messages from students have come expressing their sad feelings at his demise. Mr Salil Shetty, an eminent alumnus, in his message says that Fr Walter was compassion personified. He loved the poor and the under-privileged. From him he learnt that the real meaning of being a Jesuit to be person of compassion. Some of the staff members who were very close to him like Mr G K Govinda Rao, Dr H S Ventatesh Murthy and Dr T V Narasimha Rao expressed in tears how much they are missing him. Such is the feeling of many persons who were in touch with him. He had built a good contact with the public and always remained close to them. All are feeling the loss of this great soul.

Fr Walter was very practical and down to earth in every situation. Wherever he went, he put his studies and knowledge into practice. He was a master in economics. He kept himself up to date with the economics and taxation system and could advice even the auditors. He could speak confidently with anyone on the practical matters of tax and economic crises. He looked into new situations and tried to gain as much knowledge as possible. His personality was such that he shared all he had unhesitatingly with others. He was a generous and outgoing person and could reach out to anyone in need.

Fr Walter was a great Jesuit and a wonderful priest. As a Jesuit, he was a person for others and placed himself at the service of others. He was always eager to accept any spiritual assignment. The problem of poor vision did not hold him back in doing his spiritual work. In the house he was regular for his spiritual duties and community exercises. For him there was no hesitation in accepting the assignment from the superior as the will of God. He went without hesitation to institutions he was asked to go. His life style was simple and down to earth. He had a great vision for the Society and he lived this vision in his life to put magis into practice. He was very gentle and caring for those under his charge. His concern for their studies and health was outstanding. His was a truly dedicated life, and sacrificed

himself for others. In the words of Annie Dillard: 'The dedicated life is the life worth living.' Such was his life. He was a man of prayer and service. As a Jesuit he showed us what and how much hard work and dedication can accomplish.

Fr Walter was a voracious reader and he regularly read newspapers, journals, novels and story books. He made effort to read with the help of a magnifying glass. He had phenomenal memory and he remembered names of students, staff, and was good at numbers. We used to tease him about his memory for railway time table and telephone numbers. He was the lover of sports and encouraged games, particularly cricket, in the college. He watched every game and was eager to get sports reports when the college teams went for competition. The sports men and women were much attached to him and he encouraged them.

Fr Walter was a scholar of his own type. But he was an intellectual and did extremely well in his studies. He taught well and his wise and adequate reflections made one understand how well read he was and kept himself up to date with the present-day theology and Jesuit Society matters. He never looked for any appreciation for his work and did whatever he had to do beautifully with humility and quietness. He was a down to earth person and never waited anyone to do any service to him. Till the last he wanted to come to the dining hall and remain with the community.

Fr Walter was a man with a vision. He always thought ahead of time. He had a great vision for the institutions where he worked. He had a great vision for his students. He loved people in need and those suffering. He had many close friends and that was evident with constant visitors coming to visit him. He had a sizeable crowd of Jesuit friends who called him regularly.

Above all, he was a priest, an outstanding one too, a good Jesuit dedicated to his ministry and mission. He did everything well with constant fidelity to his master. He had time to pray, meet people and do his work. He took much responsibility and was always available for ministry which he undertook with care and affection. Indeed, he was a man of God and showed it in practice.

He manifested his spiritual strength in his sufferings. Never did he exhibit resentment or pain or negative feelings towards his sickness. At times there was pain and he did not show it at any time. He accepted all with a smile. Rosary and crucifix were his constant support and companions. His concern was towards people and their problems and not himself. He placed his life at the service of others, particularly the community.

The Jesuit community of Fatima Retreat House will surely feel his loss and so also the Karnataka Jesuit province. Now we are here around the last remains of Fr Walter. We now surrender him to God and to mother earth. We will miss him and yet his memory will remain with us for long time to come.

Let me conclude with a little poem:

The tide recedes but leaves behind bright sea shells on the sand.
The Sun goes down but its gentle warmth still lingers on the land.
The Music stops and yet it echoes on in the sweet refrains.
For every joy that passes something beautiful remains.

Dear friend Walty, let me as your companion and friend along with the FRH community and Karnataka Jesuit province say good bye to you now. We will miss your simplicity and smile. We all cherished your affection, companionship, friendship and you will be remembered forever. Remain with Jesus and with Mary always and bring down to us many blessings. Fr Jayant Kumar Padival, SJ
(16 April 1950 – 08 September 2020)

Dear Friends,

Last evening, we heard that Fr Jayant was critical and within the next few hours we heard that he was gone. It is so unexpected, unbelievably fast. He disappeared from our midst all of a sudden. Ever since we received the news of his critical health, we stormed heavens with prayers hoping that he would pull through. But God's plans were different. He wanted him back. We can only accept God's plan, hard as it may be.

Fr Jayant came to the Northeast in the early 1980s to work as a missionary in Nagaland and Manipur. He served as a pastor in Bishnupur parish and gave leadership to our schools in Manipur. Thanks to his proficiency in the Manipuri language, he was much sought after for catechetical training of the laity. His simple yet deep spirituality endeared him as a spiritual director to many young seminarians at St Thomas Seminary in Imphal and the priests in the Archdiocese of Imphal. He carried his Jesuit virtue of availability on his sleeves and was ready to go anywhere, anytime, putting up with limited facilities and numerous inconveniences. Our communities in Manipur, Nagaland and Meghalaya have immensely benefited from his services.

Fr Jayant's greatest gift was his humane way of relating with people, young or old, educated or illiterate. That is what made him a successful missionary, a much sought-after spiritual director and a successful pastor. He built brick by brick not only the buildings where he was assigned, but also the faith of the people. He pioneered difficult missions in Manipur. The moment he got into Manipur, he learnt the Manipuri language and used it adeptly to narrate stories from the Bible to children and to impart Christian faith to the elders in the Bishnupur Parish. In fact, he was the first Kohima Jesuit to learn a local language and use it effectively for pastoral ministry – a beautiful model for the younger men to emulate.

Let me share with you briefly, Fr. Jayant's journey in the Northeast of India. Having arrived in Nagaland in 1980, he worked in Chizami for four years with a brief interval for his tertianship. From Chizami he moved to Bishnupur in 1984 to be the headmaster and parish priest for the next eight years. From 1993 to 1997, he served as spiritual guide for the minor seminarians in Imphal. From 1998-2002, he served as principal of St Xavier's School Moirang, at a time when threats and death warrants from underground outfits in Manipur were commonplace. He did not hesitate to stay on and work in spite of the danger to life. He braved the anxieties of this assignment nonchalantly. A new chapter began in his life when he moved to Shillong in 2003 to be the socius to the novice master. In 2006, he was assigned to St Ignatius Loyola parish, Maweit where he was much loved for his pastoral services. In 2011, he returned to Manipur, but this time as the pastor of a remote parish in Liyai Village, among the Poumai people. In Liyai, he lived a frugal life and served tirelessly for six years as parish priest and principal of our school.



His indomitable missionary zeal was doused only by his lungs, which had become weak because of his years of service and sacrifice to the people. It was this health setback that took him back to

Karnataka. And sadly, it was these same weak lungs that took him back to his heavenly father.

Dear Fr Jayant, on behalf of the Kohima Region, I want to thank you for the dedicated service you offered to the people of Northeast India for over four decades. You were indeed one of the unsung heroes of our Region. What you have accomplished in your life is remarkable. Your resolute zeal for the mission, your caring commitment for the people, your quiet generosity towards the needy and your wise guidance to the clergy will remain etched in our memories. You leave behind a rich legacy to your younger brothers. We pray in thanksgiving for the gift of your life. May your soul rest in peace, and may all of us, especially your grieving family members, relatives and friends, experience the comfort of our faith in the Risen Lord.

Adieu, dear Jayant, our loving brother. We are proud of you. Rest in peace and may you see the face of God forever.
