





Fr. Isidore Pinto was born in 1942 at Maryneer House, Hosabettu, in Mangalore Diocese, as the youngest of the nine children of Late Raymond and Magdalene. He was the youngest and much-loved person of the family. After his schooling, propelled by the desire to become a priest, he joined Gonzaga House, the apostolic school, while doing his high school and PUC from St. Aloysius in Mangalore. He joined the Society of Jesus in 1963 in Patna Province. After completing his graduation in Ranchi and studies in philosophy and theology in Pune and Delhi respectively, he was ordained a priest in 1976 in Mangalore. Following his tertianship in Sitagarha in 1979-80, he pronounced his final vows in 1982 in Ara. He completed his B.Ed. from Loyola College of Education, Jamshedpur in 1983.

Fr. Pinto was a soft spoken, simple, sincere and dedicated person, who spent his entire apostolic life in the education ministry serving as the Head Master of the Middle Schools in Chuhari and Ara, Vice Principal of K.R., Bettiah and St. Xavier's, Patna. After a brief stay at Sanjivan Niwas, the pre-novitiate, he retired to XTTI in 2006.

Fr. Isidore Pinto was a person of committed, serious, and steady character. He was faithful to his commitment to the Jesuit religious life - he was very regular with his daily Eucharist and other spiritual exercises, which was the centre and source of his life; and, he always carried out the responsibility entrusted to him to the best of his ability. Serving in different schools over a span of thirty years, in a quiet and unassuming way, he enriched the lives of the students. Beyond his teaching in the class room, his life was a witness to order and discipline, which are the corner stones of character formation in students. His rhythm of life built on simplicity of life style, perseverance in monotony and service, with no expectation of anything in return, had taught the students more than his words. He loved his students and was kind and generous to them. He was readily available to serve in any capacity and did his work whole heartedly, whether it was serving in a school or leading daily choir during the Eucharist at Xavier Bhawan. He was always neat and prompt in all he did.

As a man of faith and prayer, he was an eloquent witness of a person consecrated to God. He was committed to his religious life and devoted to priestly ministries. He loved the Society of Jesus, his companions and cherished his vocation as a priest. He didn't keep any grudge against anybody. He was concerned about the poor and reached out to them in his own way.

Fr. Pinto struggled with health problems quietly throughout his life. He underwent a life-saving surgery for thyroid problems as a scholastic, and later as a priest, he had a heart surgery. Fr. Isidore exhibited contentment and interior peace. Conscious of his own limitations, and concerned about his failing health in later years Fr. Isidore rarely ventured out beyond the extent necessary for discharge of the specific responsibility entrusted to him.

On the 7th August, the day of his death, he joined the community for mass and meals, though he was coughing and unwell. Since he didn't show up at his regular time for tea, one of our co-workers visited his room and found that he had passed away in his sleep. As in life, so in death, he passed away quietly, not wanting to trouble anyone. May the Heavenly Father who sees what is done in secret, reward His silent servant with eternal life! (Mt 6:4-6) May his soul rest in peace!

Patna Jesuit Mission History: Ganga Lahar Supplement-6

Two Pioneering Mission Ventures of Patna Jesuits

As noted in earlier chapters, Patna Jesuits, entrusted with Patna Diocese, inherited 21 mission stations where they pastorally cared for the existing Catholics (Indian, Anglo-Indian and Europeans including chaplaincy service to Catholic solders of the British Army). In this chapter we discuss the first two new initiatives of the Patna Jesuits: founding of Gahiri (Ghyree) Mission in north Bihar and evangelisation of Santals in south-eastern Bihar. The former flourished for a decade, but declined thereafter, and the latter flourished for a decade but was handed over to the Franciscans.

Our Lady of Victory Mission, Gahiri

Gahiri mission, founded by Fr. Henry Westropp in 1924, was the first missiological experimentation of the American Jesuits in Bihar. It was there they experienced the pangs and pain of evangelisation among non-Christians and learnt tough mission work in the crucible of opposition.

Westropp's strategy of evangelisation was through self-sufficiency programs, first caring for their hungry bodies, then caring for their souls. He set up job-oriented industries such as spinning, weaving, dying of cloth, carpet making, collection of used stamps, processing and reselling them, etc.

He had done the same type of mission work earlier at Chuhari (1922-23) and Chanpatia (1923-24). The industrial workshops housed in huts made of grass and mud at Chanpatia incidentally got burnt in fire. Realizing the need of pukka building structures, he acquired the Indigo Factory in Gahiri, then in the possession of the British in lieu of the debt the Bettiah Raja owed to them, and was managed by a German planter. The Factory and the plot of 30 acres near an adjacent lake was acquired for Rs. 9000/- and he set up his cottage industries wherein a large number of poor people (outcastes, lower castes, catechumens and Christians and a few "old Christians" from Chuhari) were employed.

Soon he got a Post Office sanctioned through which hundreds of letters and parcels would go to all his benefactors and clients in various parts of the world. The Austrian Holy Cross Sister Frida came to help with her medicines, and a few Clara Bahins (Bettiah's indigenous congregation) from Bettiah came to teach in the schools. On July 15th, 1927, Fr John Kilian replaced a worn out Westropp, followed by Fr. Carl Miller and Fr. Raymond Conway. They made missionary visits to Chapra, Siwan and Motihari.

Trials and Persecutions

Aside the natural calamities were persecutions. The missionaries were tensed with apprehension, for anti-missionary elements threatened to burn down the mission and kill the missionary. There were a number of instances, of which a few are narrated here.

In 1927, awful rumours began to circulate among the people around: '125000 Doms around Gahiri were Christians and were to be rounded up for a monster sacrifice somewhere. For other sacrifices innumerable Dosadhs, Chamars, Natuas and other low castes were to be seized,' etc. Another rumour was that a bridge was being built, somewhere whose pillars could only be fortified by sacrificing and burying children under them. But the priest took all these in his jovial way.

Arya Samaj known for its violent opposition to Christianity was active in the area. It tried all means to prevent people going to the mission and becoming Christians. Its followers had once harassed the old Bettiah Christians who boldly chased them away with a shower of bricks. So they turned to Gahiri.

Once an unusual crowd of Brahmins, Sadhus, Babus, peasants, and others armed with bamboo staffs barged into the mission. The cool Kilian confronted them in his genial way. He took out this camera – he had no film in it – and made a tremendous show of talking pictures of the different angry faces surging around him. The fear of prosecution by civil administration given the un-lying evidence of the camera saved the day. Sneers and jeers went for a while, and the mob dispersed with a tremendous shout, "Hindu Dharmki jay". Soon afterwards, a large truck filled with armed volunteers of the Bihar Light Horse, a small militia of the

European planters came followed by the Bettiah Police, to assure protection.

On another occasion there was a plot against Kalian's life. Further, word went around that he would be drowned in the lake. But Kilian had his "intelligence department" of hostel boys who did not sleep, and were alert. Our Lady of Victory Mission looked more like Our Lady of Defeat.

At the end of a decade, there were over 300 converts in Gahiri. There were some 200 employed persons in the mission. In addition to the Industrial School the Mission conducted primary schools, 5 night schools for adults and one school for girls catering to 193 students of whom 116 were non-Christians, with the help of 70 catechists, besides the native Clara Bahins.

Gahiri mission was practically abandoned in 1934 due to the Bihar earthquake and the Great Depression in America. It remained a visiting station for almost 50 years. What we presently see in Gahiri is a resurrected mission where the Sisters of Notre Dame established a primary school, health centre and socio-pastoral centre under the then diocese of Muzaffarpur in 1983. It had only about 25 Christians.

The Santal Saga

Unlike the Gahiri initiative, the Santal initiative was a huge success. It was started, again by Westropp, the mobile missionary of Patna Mission. During his stay for 'rest'at Jamalpur, he surveyed the Santal villages ¬around. Later when he was transferred to Jamalpur he opened the mission of Burka Hatiya in 1927 among the Santals. With the active support of Bishop Van Hoeck, the Santal mission was started and Fr. Peter Sontag and Fr. James Creane joined in. The new Bishop Bernard Sullivan and the new Superior Sontag were quite supportive of this new venture.

The Santals living in Godda Subdivision, of Bhagalpur District of Bihar, juridically belonged to the Archdiocese of Calcutta. The Bengal Jesuits had attempted to evangelise them for nearly 60 years. Unsuccessful and due to want of men, the Calcutta Archbishop requested Patna Jesuits and the mission area of Godda was commissioned to Patna Diocese.

The superior of Patna Mission practically drained the other areas of the mission of manpower in order to make a concerted effort at evangelizing the Santal field. By August 1929, over a hundred Santals had been baptized.

Besides the two pioneers (Westropp and Creane, known as 'Santal Jim'or 'Santal Tramp') several Jesuits such as Kilian, Dertinger, Edward Scott, Frank, Miller, Morrison, et al, worked there. In 1930 Bishop Sullivan asked the IBMV (now CJ) Sisters to help evange-Fr. James Creane SJ lize, teach and heal the Santals.

The Santal Mission was a big success compared to the Dalit mission in Champaran. Twenty four 24 Jesuits, 8 sisters, assisted by over 90 catechists and numerous school teachers, worked hard and effected numerous conversions (6,107 Catholics in 1927, 8,533in 1938). Mission centres Baccha, Poreyahat, Gajhi, Chakai, Barka Hatiya, etc. were founded by them.

Unfortunately, the flourishing Santal Mission lasted only ten years for Patna Jesuits because they did not spare more missionaries for a growing mission. Therefore, on December 8, 1938, the Santal Mission

was handed over by Bishop Sullivan to the Third Order Regular (TOR) Franciscans from Pennsylvania, America. Eventually the Santal Mission developed into Bhagalpur Vicariate in 1956, and Bhagalpur Diocese in 1965: presently the most successful diocese in Bihar.

The decline in Champaran and the loss of Santal did not deter the Patna Jesuits. With effervescent enthusiasm and commitment, they began to work among the Dalits in central Bihar, south of the Ganga, by mid

1930s. During the next 40 years the Dalits responded to evangelisation in large numbers. These converts comprise the largest segment of the Catholic community in Patna Mission. We shall discuss this story in the next chapter.
