St. Xavier's, Boirdadar

For the first time, St. Francis Xavier's Church was blessed with the live telecast of the Holy Eucharist on 18th Sunday on 1st August by the Diocese. The faithful were enthused. They used to come in big numbers during the difficult time of ours. Kudos to the telecast group.

Fr. Zacharias Lakra went through a general health check-up and had sonography. He had treatment for thyroid in JMJ hospital. Fr. Stephen Xaxa was rushed to Apollo, Bilaspur for his angiogram.

Fr. Zacharias guided a retreat to Sr. Pushplata SJC for a week on her home leave. She enriched herself and took along the prayer book of UAP with rich in experiences of religious life pointed out to constant search for spiritual nourishment.

The International Day of Indigenous People was celebrated combined with the "Sarva Adivasi Samaj" association. It was organized by this group and it was encouraging to see Adivasis coming with traditional dresses and cultural programmes. The demonstration and whole show focused on the importance of the day and reminded of injustice done to them. It was the time to resolve to come forward and fight for their fundamental Constitutional rights. All prayed to God to become more vibrant.

The Executive of Mahila Sangh and Fr. Zacharias met Bishop Paul Toppo and Fr. Sylvanus Xalxo, VG for the installation of the statue of our Lady of Velankani on 30 August. The novena to Mother Mary on her nativity started thereafter.

The catechists and the Parish Priests were called by Bp Paul Toppo for the meeting in which he gave the kit to face the forthcoming third wave of Covid-19 with some instructions. The communities of priests and



religious were given a month ago. The donors were kind enough to provide them for the families.

The CRI unit of Raigarh had a meeting at Ursuline Convent, Dharamjaigarh. Many communities did not turn up but the usual proceeding was complete. Fr. Zacharias Lakra welcomed all after the prayer service and presented the report of the last meeting. Sr. Matilda Kujur, JMJ put the financial status. Then the newcomers were welcomed. The highest number was from the place itself. Fr. Sudhir Bara, Parish Priest, and Dean, the speakers of the day were honoured. This was followed by the election of the Executives. Fr. Zacharias Lakra was re-elected to continue but Fr. Martin M. Tirkey was elected President of CRI, Raigarh. After the talk and confession by Fr. Sudhir Bara the Holy Eucharist was officiated by Fr. Emmanuel Miree, CRS along with other co-celebrants.

The National flag was hoisted by Fr. Zacharias Lakra and Shri Deepak Ekka respectively in St. Xavier's and



Mukti Prakash Schools on 75th Independence Day. The directives of the Govt. were followed: no parade, no speech, no national, patriotic, and cultural programmes. However, Fr. Martin M. Tirkey thanking all, delivered a holistic view of India.

Jeevandhara Ashram, Mauhapali

Jeevandhara School being in a remote rural area, online classes for the academic session 2021-22 were not possible. Many students did not have mobile phones to attend online classes. Those who had phones, many of them couldn't afford to have the required internet data. Even the Mohalla classes proposed by the school department were not feasible. Students were spread over 15 villages and having classes at one or two villages was not possible. The school took the middle path. Students were invited to the school campus, and classes were held on the school veranda, cycle shed, and even under trees. About 75% of students regularly attended the classes.

The impact of Covid-19 was still prevalent in the rural area, especially in social and economic life. Many poor people who relied on daily wages did not get work in



the locality. Many families took loans to meet their basic needs. With the help of the Indian Social Institute, New Delhi and Conference Development Office, and New Delhi, Province Development Office, Jesuits at Mauhapali were able to distribute rations to 90 families of four villages. People were extremely happy to receive the ration items. They expressed that the gesture of concern was just huge.

All Jesuits, Ursuline Sisters, and head catechists made much effort to identify the beneficiaries with their Aadhar and mobile number. They finally managed to distribute the ration items. Beneficiaries were invited on 11 August. Each family was given rice (20 KGs), Dal (4 kgs), and cooking oil (one litre). Many more families from the same and the neighbouring villages expected similar relief packages.

The Principal organized a one-day orientation programme for the teaching staff at Mauhapali on 17 August. Fr. Prabhunarayan Khalkho, Principal, St.



Xavier's School, Baramkela was invited to give inputs on holistic teaching-learning approaches in the school. He highlighted how teachers needed to go the extra mile to understand students and give them the required impetus for learning and comprehension. After the input session, each teacher taught the students in the presence of all the teaching staff.

Every teacher was asked to evaluate the presentation of other teachers. After teaching, mutual feedback was given. The process of this teaching-learning method enlightened all. Based on the feedback from teachers, Fr. Principal announced that the teaching of Sch. Almon Lakra was the best.

St. Monica Day was observed as Mother's Day in the Parish on 29 August. Fr. Anmol Lakra from Baramkela was the main celebrant for the occasion. After the Eucharist, women served breakfast for all the faithful. The day was observed in a meaningful way to draw inspiration from St. Monica for receiving God's blessings and to keep the family united.

Khrist Milan Ashram, Namna

On 14 August, Fr. Lalit Ekka felt considerably weak. He was admitted in Holy Cross, Ambikapur. The plasma volume test showed that his hemoglobin was very low



indicating anemia. One unit of blood was transfused immediately. His condition did not improve much even after eight days. He was discharged from the hospital on 21 August. His doctor, Dr. Ashok, recommended for dialysis twice a week.

Fr. Shanti took two days to inform him about his kidney problem. Fr. Lalit showed unwillingness to go through dialysis. Despite that Fr. Shanti with the consultation of Fr. Provincial planned to send him to Raipur to get ready Fistula for the dialysis. Meantime on 25 August morning, he was found fallen from his bed. He was taken to Holy Cross Hospital. It was found that he got a brain hemorrhage. Then in the same evening, he was rushed to Raipur and got admitted in Sri Narayan Hospital, Raipur. The doctors declared him out of danger. He needed no operation. Later he was taken back to Ambikapur for medical care.



Fr. Gabriel Minj too was admitted in Holy Cross Hospital on 17 August for a Boil problem near the left leg ankle. But this problem turned to be cellulitis disease. Luckily he went to the hospital in time and his left leg gastro crèmes muscle was lanced in five places. Lancing was necessary to stop infection. But the process of removing the infected blood was very painful since they squeezed it without anaesthesia. He was healed slowly. Fr. Marcel Ekka continued to go Through dialysis. Morever, he got seizures now and then. Fr. Aemilianus Lakra got confined to a wheelchair again as he was unable to walk due to the increase of eczema on his legs.

Yacub Kujur, Chief Guest, thanked the UN for declaring 9th August as Indigenous Peoples Day and declaration of Indigenous Rights, on 13 September 2007. These rights are the minimum standards for tribal identity,



dignity, and wellbeing. The UN theme for the year is, "Leaving no one behind; Indigenous Peoples and the call for new social contract". In many countries, they were driven from their land, culture, and language denigrated and their people marginalized from political and economic activities. They were never included in the social contract, to begin with. The social contract was made among the dominant

populations. Jal, Jangle, Jamin, language, and culture give identity and dignity to tribals, which must be preserved and promoted. He explained the five conditions to be included in the constitutional schedule list. The people were motivated to overcome internal weakness to progress.

Mr. Hemant Lakra, the state complainer of Lok Manch, read out the UN declaration of Indigenous Rights. Mr. Jaipal Kreketta told people to benefit from MNREGA. Teachers-Anil Tirkey, Abar Tirkey, and Sushil Bara spoke on the importance of education. Community leaders-Vinay P Toppo, William Ekka, Anthres Ekka, and three women told about the impact of the Lok Manch program in their life. Sarpanches-Rajen Kujur and Rajesh Kerketta congratulated people for coming to celebrate tribal life. Women of Aamerapara and Bandhpara awakened the participants for unity and prosperity through their songs. Mrs. Ezleen Tigga, Sarpanch of Paraghati proposed a vote of thanks and Akashdeep Kerketta and Balwant Tigga moderated the sessions. JESUIT MISSION IN MP Article 40

The Archbishop wrote to Mr. Laurie. Strange to say the dates of Fr. Van den Driessche's letter and His Grace's to Mr. Laurie are both 11th December 1912. We know already the answer of Mr. Laurie, very disappointing, far from the sympathetic letter that might have been expected. He wrote on 19th December 1912 to the Political Agent. The rather long letter to the Political Agent contains: (a) almost textually what is related in this History about Timpu of Kunkuri, (b) almost textually what is related about Ledha: Confiscation of a dand, beating near the bhandar; but to this last item he adds that to prevent Ledha from shouting, they had put a cloth in his mouth. He also adds the name of the assailant: Baglu Chik, the servant of the jungle daroga. This name was kept hidden from the Father when he took to task the jungle-daroga Nunu Baiga, who had already caused a beating to be administered to 3 Christians of Ginabahar, Etwa, Birsai and Bolo.

The Father winds up his letter with: "I could give many instances to show what the Christians have to undergo in Jashpur, but what I have said will, I hope, show sufficiently how unjustly they continue to be treated. As I know by experience that it is useless to appeal to the authorities in Jashpurnagar, I appeal again to you, Sir, to protect these helpless people against violence and injustice. I fear very much that if such a state of things is allowed to continue, we shall have some day to deplore the murder of a Christian. To old men like Ledha, for instance. a blow may soon be fatal."

The reply, dated 14th March 1913 is also among these official letters. The Political Agent had of course no other advice to give but to tell the aggrieved persons to have recourse to the courts. The remonstrance of Father Van den Driessche had not succeeded in cowing the jungledaroga. To insolence he now added the basest kind of cheating. To get the people of Ginabahar into trouble with the State, he, Nunu Baiga, had 14 trees cut down in the forest, and at night cunningly mixed with older rafters on the machans (supports for straw stacks) of the Christians. The latter had been warned of his evil intentions. For several nights they watched that no trees be cut near their fields. Seeing that nothing of the kind happened, they stopped their watch. Just then on the night between 18th-19th December, the vile treachery was done. The pieces were put on the machans of half a dozen Christians.

The above was communicated to the Archbishop in a letter of 19th December 1912. On 31st December, the Father supplied more details: (1) Nunu Baiga, jungle daroga had boasted at Jamchuan that he would send people to cut trees during the night along the fields of Ledha, Christian of Ginabahar, and then punish Ledha for it. Many people had heard him say so. (2) For several nights that field was watched, the Father himself saw the

watchers leave for it. (3) On 19th December morning, the Christians saw two people of the bhandar, the kotwar and the barahil watching the south side of the village and this raised suspicions. The people looked about to discover the possible cause and finally saw the new wood on 5 machans. Some were on machans of people who were away for begari, when they were laid there. (4) 14 trees had been cut in a small jungle nearby, the Father having seen the places himself. Afterwards 4 more were hidden under the straw on the khalihan (threshing floor) of Birsai and one at Kunkuri under the straw of Timpu's khalihan (the one that had been so severely beaten). (5) The whole rascality had been committed by the jungle daroga and his servant Baglu Chik in such a clumsy, patent manner that the Father hoped that even Nunu Baiga would not dare to act upon it. However, he adds, "In Jashpur anything may happen." As this letter is the last that refers to this rascality, very likely it had no further consequences.

Kelba-New wave of persecution

On 19th December 1912, Father Van den Driessche heard that at Kelba, one Jatta Baiga, brother of the above Nunu Baiga, had been forcing Christians to sign a *muchilka* in which they agreed to become pagan again. This time too, it was only out of fear of being beaten, that they agreed to sign. On receiving this information, the Father at once left for Kelba, and arrived just in time to stop the Christians who were being taken to that Jatta Baiga, so that they had not to sign any *muchiklka*. The Father also got hold of the papers given by Jatta Baiga to the *sipahi* he had sent to Kelba to call the Christians.

The year 1913 had just dawned, when on 4th January, Fr. Van den Driessche sent to the Archbishop a very circumstantial account of Jatta Baiga's doings. Jatta Baiga was at his home in Dipatoli, Narainpur thana. He had sent 2 of his sipahis to take Christians of Kelba to him to sign the said *muchilka*. Papers of his which he had sent along with the *sipahis*, fell into the hands of the Father. "I put the papers in my Pocket, telling the sipoy that Jatta Baiga could come to take them back, if he wished, but that I would never return them, and that Jatta Baiga had no business with the Christians." Khedu Singh, sipahi, had already extorted Rs. 13/- from the Christians. He denied it, but on hearing the Christians the ganjhu of Kelba, agreed that the extortion seemed to be proved!" Four Christians had been called by the sipahi, and were threatened to be beaten, if they did not follow them.

Jatta Baiga had sent letters in all directions for a great meeting of Baigas (sorcerers) at Kelba, on Sunday evening, 22nd December. When the news of the gathering reached Gibahahar, and that 30 Baigas were already there the Father immediately left for Kelba, although it was 6 in the evening. By 7.30 p.m. he was at Kelba. Several of the Christians had run away, others were hiding in their houses, some of them did not even dare to cook the evening meal! However no Baigas were

there; none to be seen the whole night and the following morning. They had run away. The *ganjhu* said that Jatta Baiga and his little army would come back that Monday 23rd; none came, even afterwards. They had left Kelba alone.

The papers found with the sipahi of Jatta Baiga were of 3 kinds: One was a list with the names of the 40 Christian heads of family of the different tolas of Kelba, plus the names of the Pracharak and the Baiga. The contents of the 2 others looked at first obscure, but the Father says: "I am convinced, and so were the people, that the real object was, (which thank God, I was able to prevent) that the Christians who would have gone to Jatta Baiga, would have been forced to declare themselves pagans." In one letter dated, Khalijore (Kurdeg) 31st January 1913, it is addressed to the Raja by Fr. Van den Driessche in which he complains of this Jatta Baiga and of his satellites, Lajru bhandari and Mangu mahto of Kelba. These latter threaten the Christians of Kelba with confiscation of their fields, if they refuse to obey the orders of Jatta Baiga, to return to paganism. The reply is of course the usual one: let the aggrieved persons refer their complaints to the state authorities.

The last of the series of complaints in that letter to the Raja is this: "On 31st December a field of Ledha's brother, Ringsu of Ginabhar, has also been confiscated by order of Tippu Sikhar gomasta, apparently like the preceding one of Ledha because I have been campaigning for some time in Ginabahar." He inserts a rather strange piece of news which astounded the Fathers of the Upar Ghat also: "I have heard yesterday that the German Saheb (padri) has gone hunting with the Raja last month in my part of Jashpur! I expect this will not precisely increase his popularity with his people." Just then the Raja had broken off all relations with the Catholic missionaries. The Lutheran padri, goes hunting with the Raja and gets his elephants to travel about. "These last months they have begun to build chapels in their villages, already they say, and after the rains more will be constructed. Rumour even states that they got permission to build bungalows." Rumour certainly went too fast, since they had no bungalows as yet in spite of all their efforts when the state was merged into India, in 1947!

With the Jatta Baiga episode, the Great Persecution seems to have come to an end in the Nich Ghat. There are no further incidents quoted by Father Van den Driessche, and the correspondence recorded by Fr. Hoffmann ceases with a short and last letter of 20th August 1913, merely informing the Archbishop that Fr. Van den Driessche had asked for an interview with the Raja. The latter had given this curt verbal reply to the one who brought him the letter: "Tell the *saheb* that he will have no interview." Hence the Father's long journey from Kurdeg to Nagar, was useless as far as this was concerned.

There is one letter to the Raja, dated 27th October 1914 the last pertaining to this stormy period. In it the Raja is told that the above Jatta Baiga goes on terrorizing the people, beating some, extorting money from others, trying to make them pagans again. When he, the Father, met and scolded him, on 26th October 1914, he simply answered: "Things have to be managed in this way as long as Jashpur is under political rule. It is the Raja who allows me to beat people and extract money!" This time the Raja seems to have been careful not to reply. That year 1913 brought about a complete change on Ambakona side to Fr. Van der Linden, in charge of Ambakona, was able to tell the Archbishop on 20th March 1913, that everything was quiet in his district. The same could not be said of the Gholeng districtt, confided to Fr. Bressers. There the last act in that great drama was going to start, which ended in the condemnation and Acquittal of Father Bressers, followed by the Memorandum to the Viceroy.

As a magnificat of praise and thanksgiving, Father Van den Driessche ends some of his last letters, with mention of the splendid harvest obtained: On 19th December 1912: "To finish with some consoling news: I have had since the 1st October, 650 baptisms out of which 180 adults and more than 1500 communions." Again on 31st December: "In the meantime, whatever happens, our Lord won't abandon Jashpur. Perhaps Mr. Laurie would admit that "the cause of Christianity does prosper" even in Jashpur, if he knew that during these 3 months I have baptized 713 persons, out of whom 195 adults prepared in their villages, and given 1778 Communions. I had the consolation of baptizing my old friend Ledha of Ginabahar and his two brothers." Allusion to Mr. Laurie's statement of 19 December 1912, already known: "I do not think that the cause of Christianity can prosper, if people are encouraged to defy the rules of the State," quite correct as it stands, but resting on the false supposition that people were encouraged to do so.

However fierce and numerous were the attempts to make Christians give up their religion in the Lower Ghat, nowhere were they carried on with that tenacity amounting to fury, characteristic of the Upper Ghat, as kept up by those imps of the devil, Gandur Ram in the Gholeng district and Bhanu daffedar on the Ambakona side. This largely explains why the losses in the Nich Ghat were far less than in the Upar Ghat. Another reason not to be lost sight of is that from the beginning of 1912, Father Van den Driessche was set free to devote all his time to Jashpur, whilst Fathers Bressers and Van der Linden had at the same time a large district to look after in Barway.


