FROM THE DIASPORA

It was an excellent opportunity for all of us to connect with our Lifeline since we were locked down at home. For me, it was a time of reviving my intimacy with the Risen Jesus. Now I too can say with Mary Magdalene 'I have seen (experienced) the Lord'. Thanks to the organizers of the Online retreat. I have a lot of time for reading, reflecting, writing, praying and relaxing in the nature. I go to the nearby A.C. Convent daily to say Mass for which they are very grateful. Since it is summer here and there is no sign of rain, we have severe water crisis.

Parish: Lockdown due to COVID-19 indeed was a God given opportunity for all to appreciate the beauty and meaning of family life. Though the Parish Church remained closed for the public, the Jesuit Community gathered around the altar daily

Varkey** that a few families were in real trouble as they did not have anything to eat and were not getting help from any source. After a short discussion with a few of the Parish Council members it was decided to extend some immediate help to these families. Initially 13 BPL families were helped with small amounts for their immediate need. Rs. 32,500/- was spent from the parish account. Moreover at our request Mr. Pankaj Jain, our alumnus, supplied dry food packets for 30 families. In the meantime, Bishop Oswald, made arrangement to get dry food packets ready through the generosity of MC Sisters. Fr. Murtilal, Secreatry to the Bishop and Mr. A.V. Antony, Vice President of our Parish Council made sure that these packets were reached to different parishes of the city so that they could be distributed to deserving families. Our parish also got thirty packets. Another ten packets were supplied by Ms Neelam Chopra and her family. In the first round around 45 of our Catholic families and six non-Christian families of the parish area were served with dry food kits. In the meantime, the parish unit of St. Vincent de Paul Society distributed dry food kits to thirty families. A few more of the families of the parish have come forward with dry food kits so that one more round of distribution could be undertaken to these families. We made a contribution of Rs. one lakh to the Diocesan Fund which the Bishop of Jaipur would contribute to the Relief Fund of the CM. On the Divine Mercy Sunday along with the faithful stationed at home and many across the world some of us

participated in the Divine Mercy Chaplet at 3 pm. During the lockdown period our Fathers were generous enough in providing spiritual succour to the religious houses around by way of the Eucharist on Sundays.

On March 19 we

at Xavier's suddenly realized that we are equally talented to go online and teach our students even during this lockdown. On 20th we decided to prepare online learning materials and by 31st we were ready with two weeks of teaching materials for the students. Class Teachers were provided with the name and phone numbers of all promoted students and they didn't take much time to form respective class groups in Telegram App (for the Prep and the Junior School students) and WhatsApp group for the Senior School students. Quick information was sent to the parents about starting our online classes and we uploaded all the materials already prepared on our e-care panel. On April 3 we started our online classes for Class 12 on the Google Classroom. Teachers uploaded audios/videos in the Google Classroom and had chat session with the students to clear doubts. By the second week of April we prepared a special timetable for all classes of the senior school and began our regular classes from 8:00 am to 12:00 noon on Google Classroom as well as Zoom App. The Junior and the Prep Dept too began their classes in full swing from April 15. Junior school students are using Team Link App as well as Google Meet for interactive classes and they have kept their online teaching session from 12:00 noon to 1:45 pm from Monday to Saturday. The admission list of Class 11 was published on April 17 and their regular classes too started from 22nd. It is not true to say that the online classes are going on very smoothly without any hiccups. We face problems related to network and app hacking or some students are not able to make use of this opportunity as they have no mobile phone/computer at home/or no network; but considering the progress we

have made in this online teaching, these are just minor issues!!

As usual of Xaverian philanthropy, one week after the lockdown our LTS Club, under the able leadership of Mrs. Daisy Joseph, managed to collect about Rs 55000/- from students, teachers and other well-wishers and donated the same for arranging food to poor homeless people in Delhi. Also our staff members have given consent to deduct one-day's salary to be donated to Delhi Jesuit Society's social service efforts during this difficult time of pandemic.

KHARAR/MORINDA/GSSSC ROPAR

Lockdown has brought all work to a standstill. The classes at Kharar centre have been suspended. The caretaker boy stays there; he tills the soil and tries out cultivating different vegetables in our land. We visit him once a month to keep up his spirits and motivate him to do the work he is entrusted with. Though we have been rendered immobile, we could manage distribution of food rations for about 60 poor households in six different hamlets of Morinda and Ropar sub-divisions. Sankalp Society's volunteers, animators, well-wishers and a catechist in the Morinda area collectively achieved this feat. The SHGs and their meetings are suspended. However, our animators keep in touch with the members over telephone and provide timely guidance and assistance.

It looks like no gatherings are possible in the rural or suburban areas for the coming three to four months. Hence, we are looking into possibilities of carrying out our involvement with the rural folks and their empowerment. According to some news channels and print media reports, about thirty thousand individuals have got themselves registered or admitted for de-addiction program in the state of Punjab since March 22, 2020. All these are based on self-consent. Around 58 drug peddlers are arrested in Chandigarh alone during this period. The supply chain of drugs stands broken as of now. What the civil administration, police and NGOs could not achieve previously, a tiny mite novel corona virus has achieved. The de-addiction centre run by Red Cross Society near our centre, has only five inmates presently. Others have been sent back home after completion of due treatment.

Fr. Viren and **Fr. Robin** keep sustaining themselves in Morinda centre. Provisions are home delivered since we got required contacts of vendors in the area. Robin made the online retreat by JCSA from April 5 to 12. Another novel experience was the community meeting conducted via video conference. Two of us in Morinda could see, hear and interact well with our fellow community members in Ropar and vice versa, through the virtual medium.
