JCSA Meeting 16-22 February 2025, Chennai



Il roads led to Lovola College. Chennai, Tamil Nadu as the Jesuit Major Superiors, along with the Regional Assistants, Frs. Vernon D'Cunha and M K George, gathered there for the meeting of the Jesuit Conference of South Asia (ICSA) from 16 to 22 February 2025, to deliberate on several issues. They took many decisions to enhance the life-mission of the Society of Jesus in South Asia. Continuing with the last ICSA meeting in Delhi, the Major Superiors focused primarily on the process of the Re-imagining and Re-structuring (RR) of the Society of Jesus in South Asia and they shared their personal journey of RR in smaller groups and Zonal Chairs, their perception of the process in their zones in the larger aula.

During the first two days, the Secretaries presented their annual reports in and through the lens of the RR process, dwelling on the activities conducted, successes experienced, challenges faced, and alternatives explored while implementing the RR process in their six Secretariats. In response, the Major superiors, while acknowledging and appreciating the god work being done by the Secretaries, assured them of their support. The attraction of these presentations was the presence of and observation made by the Interna-

tional Secretaries for Social Justice and Ecology and School Education, Fr. Roberto Jaramillo and Fr Alberto Mesa. They commended the great work done in these two Secretariats and reminded the Major Superiors of their responsibility to make them more effective by underscoring professionalism and integral formation, collaboration and networking in all ministries. They also presented the status of and global perspectives on the School and Social Justice apostolates.

The other highlights of the meeting were the presentations on the Eco-policy and on the De-addiction and Renewal programme by Fr John Kennedy and Fr Francis Jayapathy respectively. They enlightened the house on the crisis in homes and in the common home, and ways to address them. Along with these, we had a series of sharings on Nepal region, Bangladesh Mission and Sri Lanka province by the respective Major Superiors, on the Jesuit Conference of the European Provinces by the Conference President, Fr Renic Dalibor, on the Discernment in Common and the Magis Digital Home by Fr John Dardis and on the Apostolic Plan of the Curia Communication Department by Fr Chuks Afiawari, the Director of Communications. It was indeed food for thought and an opportunity to widen our horizons.

The privileged moment of the Chennai JCSA meeting was the presence of Fr General, who, during the two sessions, interacted with the Major Superiors on various issues. He began with the general issues like the health of Pope Francis and the ethnicity that is all pervasive in the Society and need to combat it, and then proceeded to reflect on the governance in the Society from the perspective of reimagining. He observed that our life and activities are

defined and directed by the mission and hence, there is bound to be tension. He invited the Major Superiors to focus on the mission and explore various ways to serve our mission more effectively.

The session with the Regional Assistants, as usual, was informative and enlightening. Fr MK George made a few general remarks on our way of proceeding and Fr Vernon D' Cunha clarified some issues related to finances and property in the Society of Jesus, and gave a historical perspective on the October 2025 meeting of the Major Superiors in Rome. He also spoke on the spiritual governance in the Society of Jesus as a way of being, doing and witnessing.

Of course, as the curtains were drawn to the JCSA meeting we bade goodbye to three of our outgoing Major Superiors, Fr EP Mathew, the provincial of Kerala, Fr Jebamalai, the provincial of Chennai and Fr Ranjit Tigga, the provincial of Madhya Pradesh, who, with their experience and expertise always made a difference in the JCSA meetings.

As a whole this JCSA meeting was relaxing and refreshing. The visit to Satya Nilayam and an outing to a resort enlivened the group. The time for prayer and sharing inspired the group BE BRAVE.

and of course, the generous hospitality with a personal touch of the Chennai province and Loyola Community made the Major Superiors happy and the JCSA meeting memorable.

VISITS OF FR. ROBERTO JARAMILLO BERNAL, SJ.

BERNAL, SJ, ■Secretary, SJES (Social Justice and Ecology Secretariat), Rome visited our Social Action Centre(s), operational areas and interacted with our men in Social Action, young Jesuits, and our collaborators (religious, men, women, and youth) from January 20 to February 17, 2025. He visited Ranchi, Dumka-Raigani, Patna, Bombay, Karnataka, Madurai, and Chennai Provinces. His travels across different Provinces, his sensitivity and energy to put up with various difficulties, his visits and meetings have been very encouraging. His visits culminated in his sharing about his findings in the ICSA meeting on 17th February, 2025. He appre-

ciated the work that the Provinces have been doing in the area of non-formal education, i.e. in Patna, Bombay, etc. He insisted that we must continue to invest our time and energy in the service of our priority groups. Regarding the lack of human and financial resources. he said that if the Society wants, if a Province wants, it can make the resources available for social action ministry. He appreciated the works of Lok Manch and MAIN (Migration Assistance Information Network). He emphasized that there was a need of professionalism in our approaches and works of social action.

THE TRAINING OF CCFFS BY SCOPE

On 11th Feb, 2025, the SCOPE, one of the ESP partner organisations of Pune, organized an awareness program for the CCFF (Community Convergence Facilitating Forum) of a village called Wadgaon Bande and distributed the IEC materials on government schemes to 10 women, including 3 Community Leaders (CLs), who hosted and organized the program for the day. The Pension & health issues were taken up for the discussion and it was decided to follow them up. All women from the village have a plan to organise a meeting of Gram Sabha and invite the government officials for passing a resolution to have a

Mahila Asmita Bhavan in the village for having different programs.

On this day, the participants had three programs: (1) Haldi Kukum with sharing of gifts for all the women participants, (2) Awareness program on pension / health schemes and PDS grocery scheme and (3) Sovabeen food processing demo training. The duration of the program was 11.00 am to 5.00 pm. Thanks to the Community Leaders (CL) Ms Punam Khunte, Priyanka ladhav and Swatitai for organising the program. The training by Community Trainers: Capacity Builders and Campaign Facilitators was very enriching and the presence of the local IBC Team was very encouraging for the trainers and participants.

Dr. Denzil Fernandes chaired the fourth session. He also shared his overall reflections on the seminar. The panel discussion had three eminent panelists, Professors Virginius Xaxa, Sonajharia Minz and Amit Mitra. There were 35 participants. The entire seminar brought to light empirical details of how the health of disadvantaged groups in India was affected by climate change.


The lecture was divided into two sessions. In the first session Adv. Nolen-

he Prof. Richard De Smet and Prof. Jean de Marneffe Memorial Lecture was held to honor two great scholars known for their contributions to Philosophy and Theology. This year's theme "Philosophies of Resistance and Freedom: Exploring Buddhist and Bhakti Poetry", aimed to explore how poetry can express deep philosophical ideas about freedom and resistance.

The program started with a prayer song. It created a peaceful and reflective atmosphere for everyone. Fr. Doni Raja gave the welcome address. He greeted everyone warmly and spoke about the importance of the theme. He also gave a brief introduction about the speaker. Fr. She explained how Bhakti poets used their words to challenge unfair practices in society and promote equality and love. The audience enjoyed her clear and passionate explanations. The session ended with another lively Q&A session where the audience shared their thoughts and asked meaningful questions. The memorial lecture was a great success. It was a day of learning and inspiration who attended.

Fr Vernard Antony SJ, JCSA Youth Coordinator, the resource person for the Youth TOT, discussed "Youth Empowerment." He then spoke on the four Apostolic Preferences of the Society of Jesus emphasizing the importance of being a leader focusing more on unorganized youth. 

Tanmaya Sadhana Course (6th Jan to Feb 28, 2025) (Age Group: 35 – 50)

his renewal course aims to help participants to become aware of the potential they have for wholeness and to move towards becoming one's unique person (Tanmaya). The course began with basic orientation followed by Journeying with Self exercises which creates inner awareness for what follows, namely, (a) intense inner process work that helps participants to look at the factors that hinder the call and task to become more and more one's own true self; (b) reflection, sharing, and discussion on Human Sexuality and Affectivity that gives the participants the opportunities for personal exploration as to how one's affective energies can be channeled for mature and fulfilling relationships and be at the service of a deeper spiritual life; (c) communication skills that will

help participants to become aware of their unhealthy communication patterns and to initiate new ways of communicating—expressing themselves with honesty and clarity, while simultaneously paying others a respectful and



empathic attention and; (d) reflection on Psycho-Spiritual Maturity as manifested in one's attitudes and behaviors. The course concludes with a few days of reflecting together on the new orientations to life the participants are beginning to experience and the new behavior patterns they are ready to initiate. We had 26 participants for the course.



Justice in Mining Network in 2024:

a difficult year that we face with hope

For the Justice in Mining Network, 2024 has been a year of transition. In June we published the 2019-2023 Progress Report and began to define the next stage. However, due to important absences. some the 2025-27 action plan has not progressed at the desired pace. Three members who until now had represented Latin America. Canada and Asia-Pacific in the steering group have moved on; and in the case of the representatives of Africa and Madagascar and Europe, there have been temporary absences for family or academic reasons. Nevertheless, we would like to thank Heriberta Fernandez, Victor Reves, and lack Piper for their work over the years, their Social Centres and the rest of the people who have kept the network alive.



Among our plans for 2025 we included the territorial strengthening of the network and the identification of common priorities. In this respect, the advance in India has been significant. The Indian government has announced the opening of 35 new coal mines in the next five years. The Bagaicha Social Centre, together with other lesuit social centres, warns of the constant pressure these projects exert on the indigenous/ Adivasi communities of the central-eastern states of India (Iharkhand, Odisha and Chhattisgarh). Field visits to districts such as Godda and Dumka show how the violation of the right to consultation, forced displacement and the harassment of their populations are commonplace. With the help of the Australian Province and following the legacy of Father Stan Swamy, these social centers are maintaining regular contact with local communities, organising capacity-building projects and strengthening the traditional local government system within indige-

territories. Representatives of 25 indigenous peoples offered similar testimonies at the meeting 'Abyayala: Extractivism, Women and Resistance' organised by the Network of Solidarity and Indigenous Apostolate (RSAI) in Manaos (Brazil) last September. The meeting is part of the Common Apostolic Project of the Conference of Provincials of Latin America (CPAL). Canadian International Jesuits supported the production of the report, which includes three case studies, and the presence of the Alboan Foundation at the meeting also helped to forge alliances between the RSAI and the Justice in Mining group with a view to disseminating the report. In the Global North, the main

achievements took place in the field of corporate regulations. After more than five years of negotiations, the European Union approved the Corporate Sustainability Due Diligence Directive, which incorporates human rights and environmental due diligence obligations for global value chains. During this time, the Alboan Foundation, the lesuit European Social Centre and the Network of Centres in Latin America have collaborated with CIDSE and other faith-based organisations to gather the support of more than 200 religious leaders and show their support for the law. Similar laws are being discussed in other countries. such as Canada. That is why we also celebrate joint training projects on advocacy and corporate accountability that are being carried out between Canadian Jesuits International (CII), Canadian Lawyers for International Human Rights (CLIHR) and the Arrupe Centre for Research and Training (CARF) in the D.R. Congo. At a global level, in 2024 we have also collaborated on a joint project between the Catholic Peacebuilding Network and the Kroc Institute (at the University of Notre Dame) and the Laudato Si' Research Institute at Campion Hall (University of Oxford) entitled "The Catholic Church and Mining: Exploring Pathways Towards an Integral Ecological Peace". So far, three regional online seminars have been held, specifically for Latin America, Asia and Africa, with the participation of regional Bishops' Conferences, Catholic organisations, Jesuit



Social Centres and research institutes. As a result of this process, a guide document entitled 'Catholic Approaches to Mining: A Guide for Reflection and Action' will be published in 2025. It is designed to help Catholic organisations that accompany communities affected by mining to advocate in defence of human rights, peace and integral ecology. In 2025 we will focus on strengthening the capacities of members with this document and finalising the 2025-2027 action plan. Among the main challenges is the participation in the People's Summit to be organised in Brazil, during COP30, and the coordination with the rest of lesuit institutions that will be attending this event. At the organisational level, on the other hand, we will begin a reorganisation process to facilitate the integration of Justice in Mining as a working group in the Integral Ecology network. In this way, we hope to open up participation to more social centres, gain in impact and deepen the spirit of collaboration between Jesuit works.
